STRENGTHENING THE ROLE OF STAKEHOLDERS IN CHILD PROTECTION

CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) constantly focuses to strengthen and systemize Child Protection in India through its efforts. These efforts are carried out collectively and in collaboration with the Government of India, State Government and Civil society organizations in order to make children's issues a priority on the National Agenda. In addition, CHILDLINE discusses and dialogues with its partner network through various meets which result in universal programs and protocols to build an effective Child Protection practice.

NORTH

AJMER

The District Administration (DA), Ajmer has offered support to CHILDLINE Ajmer by granting permission to place hoardings at 11 different places around Ajmer city in order to increase CHILDLINE visibility and awareness and reach out to the general public.

KOTA

A joint meeting was held by CHILDLINE Kota and the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) where it was announced that complaints related to child labour and child marriage should be registered on 1098 and that maximum benefit should be taken from this service. Officials from Women and Child Development Department, Social Justice and Empowerment Department and District Legal Service Authority were part of this crucial meeting.

JALANDHAR

CHILDLINE Jalandhar organized a training session to sensitize police personnel on the 1098 service and the Juvenile Justice Act. Important aspects of the Act were explained by Mr. Inderjit Singh, Project Director, National Child Labour Project (NCLP), Jalandhar District. He explained the significant role the police plays in child rights and the need to enhance their awareness level on child related issues.

SRINAGAR

A day long program was organized with the Srinagar police to sensitize them on the need to protect children from border conflict and militant retaliation besides setting up special juvenile police units. Policemen from the strife torn Srinagar were enlightened about CHILDLINE and the challenges faced by the team during a curfew or when children battle it out for their safety during border cross-fire or peak time militant violence. At the end of the program, the Srinagar police pledged their support in implementing the Government mandated Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS) in Jammu and Kashmir, a move that will help curb juvenile crime and better police surveillance at the time of intervention and nabbing offenders.

CHILDLINE Solan was awarded for their work in eradicating child labour. The award was presented to the team by Kaul Singh Thakur, Honourable Minister, Health and Revenue, Himachal Pradesh



MEERUT

In order to reach out to a large number of people an announcement was recorded by CHILDLINE Meerut which included a message about 1098. The Regional Manager of Uttar Pradesh State Road Transport Corporation, Meerut Region issued a circular to play this message at every bus station, everyday all over Meerut.

DELHI

The District Magistrate developed a Sub Divisional Level Vigilance Monitoring Committee for the Abolition of Bonded Labour System (under The Bonded Labour System Abolition Act 1976) and nominated CHILDLINE North Delhi as a member for the same.

SOUTH

GULBARGA

Dr. Nalini Namoshi, District Surgeon at the District Government Hospital ensured that as medical cases are being frequently registered to 1098, in case children require a separate staff nurse to take care of them in emergency situations or if there is an urgent need of ventilator facilities then these can be arranged for at the District Hospital in Gulbarga.

IDUKKI

Child protection boards have been placed in various tourist spots in Idukki District by the District Tourism Promotion Council to generate awareness.

KARAIKAL

A joint task force comprising of members from CHILDLINE and Department of Women and Child Development as well as Social Welfare Department will be set up to rescue child labourers in the district.

KANNUR

Training programmes on The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012 (POCSO) and the Juvenile Justice Act were conducted for tribal promoters and hostel wardens.

PALAKKAD

Cases of child sexual abuse (CSA) have been on the rise in Palakkad. CHILDLINE teams carried out training workshops for women police officers to induct them on the methods and procedures of taking statements from CSA victims.

SALEM

Salem CHILDLINE organized a Resource Organization meeting for all the wardens of Children's Homes' in Salem district. Guidelines regarding children homes and adoption were covered during the meet. The resource persons for the meeting were Mrs. Devaki., District Child Protection Officer, Salem & Mrs. Kalpana, Director, Adoption Centre, Life Line Trust, Salem.

NAGAPATTINAM

CHILDLINE received a circular from Tamil Nadu Corporationfor Women Development to conduct CHILDLINE awareness in all Panchayat Level Federation (PLF) trainings organized in Nagapattinam.

A convergence meet was held at the SCM House in collaboration with CHILDLINE, Karnataka State Commissions for Protection of Child Rights (KSCPCR) and Sparsha Trust. Issue based discussions were held with various stakeholders. Decisions regarding the smooth functioning of 1098 in every district of the state were also considered. CHILDLINE partners from 17 different districts including Bangalore, Mandya, Vijayapur, Mangalore, Mysore, Kolar, Bellary, Raichur, Devangare, Gulbarga, Kopala, Badar, Hassan, Kodugu, Belgaum, Tumkur, Dharwar, NGO Directors and coordinators participated in this program.

THRISSUR

Trainings were held for District Surgeons and Doctors from Primary Health Centres (PHC) and the District Hospital on The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012 (POCSO). Protocols regarding the Act were explained as per new guidelines given by the Family and Health Welfare Ministry.



MANDYA

The District Health Officer issued a circular to all Primary Health Centres across Mandya district to provide free medical treatment to cases referred by CHILDLINE.

KOLLAM

Child safety information boards were prepared and presented to 300 Government aided schools with the support from National Rural Health Mission (NRHM). These boards will be put up in the schools as a medium to create a safe environment for children in Kollam.

MAHABOOBNAGAR

CHILDLINE Mahaboobnagar organized a District level convergence meeting on child marriage. The Secretary of District Legal Services Authority, Mr. Sheshagiri Rao presided over the meeting. Project Director, The District Women and Child Development Agency(DWCDA) Mrs. Indira, Circular Inspector of Police, Mr. Som Narayan Singh and the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) Chair person, Mr. Sridhar were present for the program. The participants discussed about the crucial topic of child marriage, field level challenges, interventions and other related aspects.

BELLARY

With the support from the District Collector will set up a CHILDLINE booth at the Bellary railway station to assist children in distress.

EAST

ANDAMAN

CHILDLINE Andaman as part of their awareness drive on Child Labour, Corporal Punishment and Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) conducted screening of CHILDLINE films in all secondary schools of Port Blair.

CUTTACK

CHILDLINE Cuttack along with the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) organized a district level workshop for police officers on Juvenile Justice System and protection of child rights. SJPU members, Police officers, media personnel, CWC, JJB and DCPU members participated in this program. Mr.Sanjeev Arora, Dy. Commissioner of Police, Cuttack presided over the program as a chief guest, Mr. Soura Chandra Mohapatra, Senior Advocate, Odisha High Court joined him as a guest of honor. Dr. Pratap Kumar Rath, Psychologist and CHILDLINE members focused on the roles and responsibilities of the SJPU, Police and other stakeholders for ensuring the smooth sailing activities of CHILDLINE. Mrs. Saila Behera, Collab Director CHILDLINE, Cuttack gave a brief on the importance of CHILDLINE to facilitate and ensure JJ System. Mrs. Dolly Das, Member, CWC, Cuttack gave a brief presentation on the roles and responsibilities of the CWC. Mr. Soura Chandra Mohapatra, Senior Advocate, Odisha High Court explained about the various Acts and rules that have been laid down in the best interest of children. Mr. Mr.Sanjeev Arora, Dy. Commissioner of Police, Cuttack suggested to all the police officers to support CHILDLINE and to follow the JJ Act and POCSO Act to ensure the protection of child rights.

CHILDLINE Cuttack in collaboration with Basundhara organized a worshop on "Constitutional and Legislative reform for elimination of Child labour" at the Basundhara Conference Hall. The participants were from CCIs, CWC, JJB, labour department etc. Ms. Rajalaxmi Das, Member, OSCPCR was the Chief Guest, and Mr. Chitaranjan Behera, Social Activist and Mr. Pramod Kumar Acharya, Social Activist were resource persons at the programme. They enlightened the participants about the 1098 system as well as CHILDLINE's Constitutional and Legislative aspect for prevention and eradication of child labour.

AGARTALA

CHILDLINE Agartala is now a member of the State Advisory Board under the JJ Act. CHILDLINE was also made a member of the District task force on child labour.

IMPHAL

A training Program on the POCSO Act was organised by CHILDLINE Imphal at Manipur University. This one day training program covered topics like the POCSO Act, 2012, JJ Act 2000 and linkages among CHILDLINE, DCPUs and Children homes. This program was organised by CHILDLINE Imphal in collaboration with the Department of Anthropology, Manipur University.

GUWAHATI

CHILDLINE Guwahati took part in the Eastern Regional Level Round Table Conference on Extending Social Protection to combat Child Labour which was organised by ILO, UNICEF & Assam State Commission for Protection of Child Rights. Commissioners, Secretaries, Directorsof Social Welfare, SCPS officers from Labour, Education, and SCPCR's from 12 Eastern States were present at this workshop. CHILDLINE was able to interact with the dignitaries and take the initiative to tie up with the concerned officials to strength the mechanisms on Child Protection.

TRIPURA

A State level joint workshop with the Tripura State Women Commission on Violence against children and women was conducted where CHILDLINE was invited as a resource person. Chairperson Tripura State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (TSCPCR), Chairperson Women Commission, Secretary Social Welfare and Social Education, CWC Chairperson and DIG Tripura were also present at the workshop.

CHILDLINE Jharkhand and Tagore Society for Rural Development organized a one-day training programme for ASHAs on child rights and child protection. The program was inaugurated by the Medical Officer of Maheshpur Primary Health Centre. Around 50 ASHA workers attended the programme. Spreading the word of child protection among ASHA workers helped in building up a strong safety net at the village level.

DHALI

CHILDLINE was invited for a District meeting in Dhalai where the team members presented the activities of CHILDLINE in Dhalai and also briefed about the Child Protection scenario in the state and focused on the linkages and coordination mechanism between police and CHILDINE in case intervention. CHILDLINE also organized an orientation programme for the officials on CHILDLINE activities under the supervision of the Block Development Officer (BDO), Sabhadipati of Zila Parishad and the Child Development Project Officer CDPO in Dhalai district.

DIMAPUR

CHILDLINE Dimapur organized an Orientation Programme with the DCPO, CWC and Social Workers under ICPS on CHILDLINE activities.

CHILDLINE Dimapur received a vehicle from the Deputy Commissioner Dimapur under the District Innovative Fund for rescue operations and all other CHILDLINE related activities. The Transport Minister of Nagaland and Deputy Commissioner of Dimapur flagged off the van.

WEST

SATNA

A meeting was conducted between CHILDLINE and different stakeholders to take steps against child marriage in Satna district. The group discussed issues such as insufficient number of police officers available for rescue operations, parents concealing child's birth certificate during the marriage to determine his/her age, lack of support from authorities for the rescue mission etc. On highlighting these points, the collector ordered for extra police force and also ensured to release an order that everyone caught conducting a child marriage will be punished as per the law. An order will also be issuedfrom the collector's office to all newspapersto not release any photo or details of the child in print.

ANAND

Child Rights Collective Gujarat (CRCG) conducted a meeting on child rights CHILDLINE and 31 other NGO's. Topics of child rights and child protection were discussed and clarified by the participants.

SURAT

CHILDLINE Surat carried out an awareness session on child labour in restaurants, hotels and small eateries in the area with the help of NGO's like Pratham, Sahas, Samta, Vanchit Vani, Jivanasta help line as well as the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), National Child Labour Project (NCLP) and college volunteers. The collector's notice was distributed to these places which ordered the owners not to employ children as workers as it is an offence and is punishable by law.

AHMEDNAGAR

CHILDLINE Ahmednagar conducted a workshop on child psychology, child development and basic needs of children withthe caretakers and staff of different NGO's and shelter homes. There were a total of 36 participants for the workshop.

The District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) held a meeting with all stakeholders working towards child welfare – District Collector, District Advisor Department, Child Welfare Committee, District Health Officer, District Education Officer, Labour Department, Child Justice Department, District Women Welfare Department, Special Juvenile Police Officer etc. The DCPU officer discussed the aims and objectives of each department and their future plan for child welfare in the district. CHILDLINE Ahmednagar was also a part of this meeting. The CHILDLINE representatives pointed out the challenges they face with different authorities when it comes to intervention. This meeting enabled CHILDLINE to put forth their problems and also to make the District Collector aware of the 1098 service. The District Collector has promised his support to CHILDLINE and the smooth functioning of the activities.

RAISEN

CHILDLINE Raisen conducted a training programme on The Prohibition of Child Marriage Act 2006 with the Collector, DWCD Officer, local NGO's and media personnel.

NASHIK

A training session on The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act 2012 was organized by CHILDLINE Nashik for police officials. The training covered topics on how to handle such cases and the procedures to be followed as stated under the Act.



These developments have significantly contributed to CHILDLINE's growth in promoting Child Rights and Child Protection.

DIVISIONAL LEVEL WORKSHOP ON ABOLITION OF CHILD LABOUR

CHILDLINE Pakur participated in the program of Divisional Level Workshop on Abolition of Child Labour, organized by Jharkhand State Commission of Child Labour at Dumka district. The City Coordinator of CHILDLINE Pakur facilitated the session and discussed about the role of CHILDLINE in addressing the issue of child cabour.

STATE LEVEL TRAINING ON ANTI HUMAN TRAFFICKING

CIF representative attended as a resource person in a State Level Training of Trainers' (TOT) programme on Anti Human Trafficking matters which was held by the Criminal Investigation Department, Govt. of Odisha. Superintendents of police of 30 districts, IG's of different regions, IG's of railways, all the designated police officers of anti human trafficking unit of State and district level were present. This training programme was also attended by the Director of Social Welfare, WCD Department. CHILDLINE team oriented the participants about the CHILDLINE service and the role and responsibilities of police department to ensure child protection through the anti human trafficking unit. CIF also submitted a concept note of CHILDLINE on request of the IG, CID Crime Branch which was circulated to all the SPs of the 30 districts for greater convergence of CHILDLINE with the police department.

STATE ADVOCACY INITITAIVE ON CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE

For the year of 2014-15 Karnataka took up the issue of child sexual abuse at the state advocacy level. To this effect a four-days training programme was held for CHILDLINE teams and DCPO staff across the state. Protocols and other important details regarding child protection and intervention and prevention in cases of child sexual abuse were shared with the participants. A total of 115 participants from 17 districts were a part of this state level training programme.

SYMPOSIUM HIGHLIGHTING PROBLEMS FACED BY SEX WORKERS

CHILDLINE Nagpur in collaboration with Matru Sewa Sangh Institute of Social Work, Nagpur and Human Rights Cell organized a Symposium to highlight the issues and concerns of sex workers in Nagpur. The Symposium aimed at bringing out societal reactions on the implications of the recent action initiated by authorities against sex workers living in the Ganga Jamuna area of Nagpur. Dr John Menachery, Principal of MSSISW said that the issue of prostitution in India is a very complex one. He said that poverty conditions play a very crucial role in pushing helpless women into sex trade and in that sense they are victims and not offenders. Agreeing that there is a need to control prostitution, he pointed out that as the issue is complex, it cannot be attempted with a one-dimensional approach like police action. A multi pronged approach ensuring the involvement of different agencies is essential. The symposium was also attended by Mr Ajay Mardikar, journalist, Dr. Shoma Sen, Mr. Eso Daniel who with his wife runs an NGO called Sharansthaan for the children of sex workers and Mr. Ram Ingole who has been at the forefront working for the welfare of sex workers in Nagpur.

The Symposium, which was attended by several other social workers and students concluded with a resolve to appeal to the authorities concerned to adopt a more humane and rational approach to deal with this issue.

STATE ADVOCACY ON CHILD MARRIAGE

Child marriage has been rampant in Tamil Nadu across districts. The CHILDLINE teams in the state work vigorously in collaboration with the child marriage prohibition officer, police and the local officials to prevent this problem. With the support of UNICEF, CHILDLINE organized a one day consultaion in Chennai to facilitate the sharing of existing practices and programmes which could be integrated for child marriage by the stakeholders. Gaps were identified and strategies to minimize the same were recommended by the panel of experts such as Mrs. Nalini Keshavraj - Gender Expert , Mrs. Girija Kumarbabu - Joint Secretary (ICCW), Mrs. Tamilarisi - Deputy Director Social Welfare, Mrs. Jeyanthi Rani - Member of TNSCPCR, Mr. Benjamin Victor – Differently abled & vulnerable specialist, Dr.Vidudalai Virumbi - DDHS.

Others who were present for the sessions and shared their insights included Mr.Vidyasagar - Child Protection Specialist, UNICEF, Tamil Nadu and Kerala, CT Manimaghalai, I.A.S Director - Department of Social Defence, Adv. Jeyanthi Rani - Member of SCPCR, Selvi. N. Tamizharasi - DD, Department of Social Welfare, Dr. S. Kannappan - Director, Rashtriya Madyamik Sikshan Abhiyan, Mr. Balamurugan - UNICEF Consultant, Salem.

To ensure quality intervention by CHILDLINE partners

To mobilize stakeholders at different levels and strengthen the existing mechanisms in place
To build the capacity of the team on the prevention, intervention and rehabilitation aspects
To take up a campaign through various activities to bring awareness among students and communities

SENSITIZING ALLIED PARTNERS

Our commitment and priority lies in creating a protective environment for our children. There is a dire need to ensure that Child Protection is understood and practiced by all who are stakeholders in ensuring the rights of a child. Catalyzing allied systems including the Police, Health Care Organizations, Education Institutions, Transport Undertakings, Telecom, Media and NGO's who have a large stake in Child Protection is vital in order to create a more sensitive and proactive society.

CHILDLINE ADVISORY BOARD (CAB) MEETINGS

The CHILDLINE Advisory Board (CAB) is the principal policy making body of CHILDLINE at the city and block level. It is responsible for ensuring the effective functioning of the CHILDLINE service. While the composition of the board may vary according to the requirements of each town or city, the suggested members comprise of representatives from the Social Welfare Department, Women and Child Development, Municipal Corporation, ICDS, Education board, Police, Health institutions, Juvenile Justice Board, Railways, Media Telecommunications, resource organizations, NGO's, corporate and concerned citizens.

The key tasks of the CAB include reviewing the functioning of CHILDLINE and suggesting measures to enhance the service. In every CHILDLINE city a CAB is formed as a protocol soon after the CHILDLINE service is launched in that city. The CAB acts as a panel that brings together decision makers of allied systems organizations and presents issues faced by children that are brought to the forefront through open house sessions and case interventions. CAB meets are scheduled once every quarter and has proved to be a platform for CHILDLINE to directly interface with allied systems to resolve issues and ensure that all allied system organizations actively participate in Child Protection.

SOME SIGNIFICANT OUTCOMES FROM THE CAB MEETINGS

- CHILDLINE Meerut will be supported by the Telecom Department to carry out a campaign to spread awareness on 1098
- Chattisgarh had a lot of positive impact post the CAB meetings. A suggestion box will be installed in every school. Along with this a CHILDLINE painting will be put up on the school walls. The DCPU and WCD have ensured coordination for proper rehabilitation of children rescued by CHILDLINE. Also the 1098 message will be printed in all school buses and city buses for mass awareness
- CHILDLINE Nagoan will be provided with a lady escort from the police department while handling cases regarding the girl child. Details related to missing children will be published in newspaper dailies with the support from the DIPR
- District hospitals in Udaipur will present cradle facilities to CHILDLINE Udaipur to keep rescued abandoned children and provide free and priority medical assistance to children brought in by CHILDLINE
- In Mandya a circular was issued to all Child Mariage Prohibition Officers (CMPOs) to take action against child marriage and publish advertisements in newspapers to provide information regarding child marriage and its ill effects.
- In Bidar the District Collector instructed CHILDLINE to carry out the age verification process at the district hospital with the help of allied departments in cases related to child labour. If the child is above 14 years of age then he/she can be sent to a shelter home to meet his/her immediate requirements.
- The District Collector in Hospet has directed the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) to have an open shelter in Hospet taluka, as since Hospet is a tourism area the issue of child beggary is highly spread here
- CHILDLINE Idukki has been asked to organize a Children's Adalath (Children's Parliament) to identify the problems faced by children and seek solutions to these problems
- Mass awareness programmes in schools and public places to be carried out by CHILDLINE Kolhapur
- In Namakkal, the Department of Social Welfare & Social Defence has been directed to identify existing homes in the district as fit institutions to receive rescued children
- Deputy Collector of Nashik discussed with the District Probation Officer, DWCD and the District Planning Committee to approve and provide rescue vans to CHILDLINE Nashik during interventions with child labourers and child beggars
- CHILDLINE's animation film 'Komal' to be screened in all Government and Government aided schools across Ramanathapuram
- As per the CAB meeting held at Kannur, it was decided to put up awareness boards on child marriage and child sexual abuse in Aralam Resettlement Area with support from Kerala Scheduled Tribe Development Department
- CHILDLINE Ratnagiri to organise sensitization programmes on 1098 for Anganwadi workers

GURDASPUR

GORAKHPUR

Children had a fun time during the birthday celebrations organized by CHILDLINE Gorakhpur. Mr. Sathyendra Kumar, Superintendant of Police (SP), Gorakhpur joined in the revelry and spent time with the children.

MEERUT

The CHILDLINE team at Meerut staged a street play at Bagpat Stand to spread awareness on children's issues and 1098.

KANPUR

CHILDLINE Kanpur noticed that many children make a living for themselves past running trains by selling panmasala and water bottles to passengers and collecting trash from trains and platforms. For most of these children, this is their way for survival as they have no one to take care of them. Government Railway Police with CHILDLINE Kanpur started an outreach for children at the railway station. The idea was to reach out to these children and convince them to spend a couple of hours every day at Kanpur Central where they would be given basic education and food. On the first day all the children were handed out fresh notebooks, pencils and other stationary. The volunteers and staff from CHILDLINE Kanpur and officers from GRP teach the children the basics of English and Hindi language as well as Mathematics. The classes are being carried out regularly for two hours every day and each child's progress is recorded and awarded with biscuits and sweets.

SOUTH

ELURU

As Eluru is situated on NH 5 that connects Visakhapatnam, Vijayawada, Chennai and Hyderabad, the CHILDLINE Eluru team decided to have an outreach programme twice a week to check on child trafficking and child labour. The team covered hotels, lodges, RTC bus stands and nearby railway stations during these programmes. Awareness was also spread among traffic police, home guards, auto drivers, coolies, circle inspectors etc who were explained about the CHILDLINE services and were requested to register a complaint if they came across any suspicious vehicles transporting children.

WARANGAL

Operation Smile, an initiative by the central government to help reunite runaway children, kidnapped children and trace out missing children was taken up by the Police department in all Telangana districts. CHILDINE also played an important role in this operation, by offering their support to the police officials and the Child Welfare Committee (CWC). Almost 173 children were rescued from various establishments, railway platforms and streets.

PUDUCHERRY

Due to recent rise in child marriage cases reported to 1098, CHILDLINE Puducherry along with the children from Jolly Home organized a campaign against child marriage. Around 200 people were made aware about the menace of child marriage and how it negatively affects the health of the child bride.

GULBARGA

In collaboration with the Rotary Club, CHILDLINE Gulbarga organized a free health checkup for the poor and marginalized slum dwellers at Rajapur. A total of 90 families including 300 children were sensitized about halth and hygiene and provided free medical assistance from doctors who had come to participate in this programme from various hospitals.

DINDIGUL

CHILDLINE Dindigul participated in the Flower show exhibition organised by the District Administration in Kodikanal. The team put up stalls with CHILDLINE banners and posters at the flower show. A large number people from all walks of life visited the stall and enquired about the CHILDLINE service. The team used the festival as a platform to create awareness on CHILDLINE among the visitors. Shri R. Viswanathan, Minister for Electricity, Prohibition and Excise along with Shri. O. Panneerselvam, Minister for Finance and Public Works Department, Tamil Nadu also visited the stall.

MANGALORE

A children's Parliament held at the Nethravati Auditorium of Dakshina Kannada District Panchayat saw hundreds of children actively participating and discussing children's issues in the presence of officials from the government and other organizations. THE VOICE OF INDIA'S CHILDREN

Child participation involves encouraging and enabling children to make their views known on issues that affect them. Given the genesis of the CHILDLINE service, its identity continues to be linked to a deep-rooted vibrant relationship with children.

Involvement, respect, best interest of the child, access to information, expression and empowerment are some of the key aspects that come to mind when we think about what the concept of Child Participation means to CHILDLINE. Similarly, being a facilitator, listening to children, acceptance and accountability are some of the requirements that emerge while envisioning our role in the process of enabling children to meaningfully participate.

CHILDLINE's belief that when children are heard and involved, systematic changes would impact their lives positively has grown even stronger over the decade of its service.

OPEN HOUSE

Open House is an open forum for children to raise issues faced by them to the CHILDLINE team. This platform also allows children to be heard and seek support of government systems. The allied systems present in a particular are invited to the Open House to participate. Held once a month, Open House is a tool for child participation to helps identify problems faced by children and for us to receive feedback on the effectiveness of the CHILDLINE service. CHILDLINE then follows up with the decisions taken to reach a logical conclusion.


SOME OUTCOMES FROM THE OPEN HOUSE CONDUCTED IN 2014 - 15



- A circular was issued by the Assistant Commissioner of the Tribal Development Department in Jashpur to all
 the government and non government schools to allow CHILDLINE to conduct open house programmes
- 8 children were admitted to a government school in Kodagu and 25 children in a Bengaluru slum were enrolled in a school
- More than 25 school droupouts were found in a slum area in Mysuru. Most of the children had quit school due
 to economic conditions. A letter was written to the District Collector by the CHILDLINE team to provide school
 facilities to these children. Post this intervention a school was set up with 3 teachers in that area. At present
 56 children are enrolled in this school.
- An Open House conducted in Jammu allowed the team to create awareness among the students of Government Middle School on child rights and child protection through a street play.
- Children from villages of Amadader, Patha, Payli, Jugthar and basgadi complained during the Open House session that the mid day meals provided to them was of a low quality and that the meals were not regular. The mid-day meal supplier in all these areas was reprimanded and now all the children reeive the meal as per the menu and on a regular basis.
- During the Open House programme in Vijayapur the children raised issues such as child marriage, sweage
 problem and lack of basic amenities in their school. As a result of the Open House session 6 child marriage
 cases were reported and intervened by CHILDLINE as well as safe drinking water facility was provided by the
 Panchayat. Along with this a plan was decided upon in order to construct the school compound and toilets for
 the students.

CONNECTING TO CHILDREN



In 2014 – 2015 we received a total of 4, 507, 424 calls from children and concerned adults. The tabulation and graphical representation for the same is listed below.




DIRECT INTERVENTION CALLS




INDIRECT INTERVENTION CALLS



GENDER OF CHILDREN ASSISTED




AGE GROUP OF CHILDREN ASSISTED



RESPONDING TO CHILDREN IN DISTRESS

In India, CHILDLINE is a phone outreach based intervention model and the work begins when a call for help comes in. As soon as this happens, local CHILDLINE teams are inform for direct intervention. Intervention covers a range of activities from rescuing children from abuse, providing immediate SOS attention, to registering a case at the police station, presenting a child to the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) in the city, developing the paperwork for onward action as directed by the CWC and so on.

Each case is unique in nature. Some take less than an hour to resolve whereas others take months of work. CHILD-LINE's operational model involves the team activating linkages to the allied system such as the Police, Municipality, Healthcare, Education and Transport Institutions along with the Judiciary, Child Care NGO's, Local, State and Central Governments. Very often, the team has to provide unique solutions that require a relevant interpretation of legislations such as the Juvenile Justice Act as well as brief allied institutions on exceptional issues.

CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE

CHILDLINE RESCUES 15 MINOR GIRLS FROM SEXUAL ABUSE

CHILDLINE Eluru rescued 15 girls who were being sexually harassed by their school Principal in Tadepalligudem, Andhra Pradesh. The CHILDLINE Eluru team received a phone call from one of the girls about the indecent behaviour by the founder cum Principal of Modern High School. The 7th standard student was completely vexed with his behaviour and mustered up the courage to finally call 1098 and complain about his conduct.

On receiving the call, the CHILDLINE team immediately informed the Nodal coordinator and Collab director, Rev. Fr. Dr. Addanki Raju with whose suggestion the team contacted the CIC to plan the rescue operation. The CIC asked the team to collect all the facts in the area regarding the allegations and question the community members about the school and the principal before heading to the school for a rescue. CHILDLINE members spent 4 rigorous days in collecting the required information from surrounding areas. They talked to the parents of the students as well so as to understand the scenario better. The team members posed themselves as parents wanting to admit their children in Modern High School and through this process they found out the reality about the school and its Principal. Some people who lived around the school confirmed the incidents of sexual abuse by the Principal. It was also found that even though some parents questioned the Principal about his behaviour, he managed to escape and settle the matter by compromising with the parents of the victim children.

After gathering all the necessary information, the CIC arranged for a 6 member team to carry out the rescue operation at the school. This 6 member team comprised of the Nodal co-ordinator, Collab co-ordinator, a counsellor and 3 CHILDLINE members. Before entering the school, the Collab co-ordinator phoned the Mandal Education Officer to participate in the operation and requested for their support if needed.

Early next morning the team approached the school Principal saying that the district collector had ordered CHILDLINE to conduct an awareness program in all the surrounding schools. On hearing this, the Principal gave his permission for the awareness program in his school. The 6 member team divided the boys and girls into separate groups for the awareness program. All the girls were taken to a separate classroom and were explained about the 1098 service for about 30 minutes. The co-ordinator then asked the girls if they knew about the number 1098. Most of the girls answered in the affirmative and informed that they knew about 1098 through an awareness program that was conducted earlier in Tadepalligudem and had also seen the number in their school text books.

The co-ordinator then enquired with the girls if they wanted to share any problems they were facing. The team observed that the girls were murmuring among themselves and it looked as though they wanted to share what was on their mind but were hesitant to do so. Later, one girl stood up and said, "Sir, I called 1098 recently". Seeing that she was scared, the CHILDLINE team assured all the girls that they would support them and help them in solving the matter. The girls were a bit relived on hearing this and slowly, one after the other; they started complaining about their Principal and his behaviour towards them. The CHILDLINE team at this time was recording the statements of each child and it was found that 15 out of a total of 25 girls were molested by the school Principal.

After recording the statements the Nodal Coordinator immediately rung up the Mandal Education Officer and informed him about the sexual harassment in the school. Soon after, the MEO reached the school he had a word with the girls and confirmed that the allegations were true. The Centre co-ordinator gave a written complaint to the MEO and called the Deputy Superintendent of Police to book the case. The Deputy Superintendent of Police in turn directed the Tadepalligudem SI to take the necessary action. The SI inquired with the girls and immediately arrested the Principal. The case has been booked under U/S 354 IPC and Sec 10 of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012.

CHILDREN WITHOUT PARENTAL CARE

CHILDLINE REACHES OUT TO THANGA FOR SUPPORT

Young Thanga's parents got a divorce when he was very young. His mother remarried and his father won the custody of Thanga along with his 2 older sisters. Unfortunately, Thanga's father passed away soon after and the boy was forced to live with his aunt. His aunt lived in a joint family and initially Thanga was looked after by his aunt and her family very well. However, after a while they started mistreating him and also accused him when some money was found missing from the house. A friendly neighbour called 1098 to report about Thanga's mistreatment at home. On meeting Thanga, the CHILDLINE team spoke to him to understand his situation better. Thanga informed that he was verbally abused by the family members on a daily basis which dampened his spirit and made him a depressed child. This depression forced him to have suicidal thoughts and he started to hate living in this house because he felt that nobody in the family cared for him or loved him.

The miserable conditions at home made him fail his exams at the surprise of his teachers who said that Thanga is usually very good in his studies and he was expected to pass with a distinction. Thanga told his teachers that he failed his exams because he couldn't study for them well. Whenever he sat down to study at night, his family accused him of taking drugs in the middle of the night. Being an impressionable child, such statements had a negative effect on Thanga. The child also told CHILDLINE that his health was not very good and that his eyesight was poor but was afraid to tell his aunt. After an argument with his aunt, Thanga was unable to bear the ill treatment to him at home and move into his neighbor's house where he was staying for the past 3 months when CHILDLINE met with him. Thanga said that he misses his mother but his mother is unable to care for him as his elder sister started staying with their mother post their father's demise.

CHILDINE members asked Thanga what he wants to do and where does he want to stay. Thanga replied that he doesn't want to stay at his aunts place neither does he want to stay at the neighbor's house as it next door to his aunt. Thanga told CHILDLINE about a pastor with who he would like to stay as the pastor's daughters are his friends and their family cares for him. Thanga along with his aunt, the pastor and his neighbor, with whom he stayed for three months, were presented before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC). The CWC gave a foster order of one year to the pastor. Along with this, CHILDLINE applied for the pastor's sponsorship for Thanga

under ICPS which was also granted. Thanga is now happy to live his life, concentrating on his studies and most of all getting the love he always wanted from a caring family.

CHILD MARRIAGE

CHILDLINE AVERTS CHILD MARRIAGE OF A MINOR GIRL

Timely intervention by CHILDLINE Ujjain with support from the Police, officials from Women and Child Welfare Department, and Child Development Project Officer successfully stops child marriage which was scheduled to take place in the Munjakhedi village of Ujjain.

CHILDLINE Ujjain team received a call from a concerned adult who informed them that Shobharam was getting his 17 year old daughter married in the Munjakhedi village of Ujjain. Acting on the tip off, CHILDLINE team swung into action and instantly brought the case to the notice of Mr. Ranawat, SDOP, Mahid who immediately informed the Jharda Police Station about the case. He instructed them to take necessary action after verifying the information and assist CHILDLINE in the process. The team also met with the officials at Jharda police station to discuss the case. Meanwhile, a rescue team comprising of the Police Sub-Inspector and officials from Women and Child Welfare Department, and Child Development Project Officer along with CHILDLINE team reached Munjakhedi village and interacted with the villagers. The team also visited the minor girl's home in Munjakhedi village about 85 kms away from Ujjain. Preparations were on for the 17 year old girl to be married off to a 15 year old boy from Malyakher Kheda in Mandsaur distirct.

The team explained to the children's parents about the harmful effects of Child Marriage, the health problems the child brides would face and the legalities regarding the offence. CHILDLINE team persuaded the parents to stop the marriage after explaining to them in detail about The Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006 which prohibits marriages of girls below 18 years of age. The parents informed the officials that they wished to conduct the marriage at the earliest as they thought the children were old enough to be married. However after much coaxing and persuasion the parents agreed that both the children were minors and marrying them off to each other was not the right decision for either child.

The police stopped the marriage after verifying the birth certificates of the bride and groom. The CHILDLINE team along with the officials convinced the parents to let go of the idea of marriage for the time being. A written letter to the police was submitted informing them that the wedding had been cancelled. The girl's father pleaded ignorance of the law prohibiting child marriage. During the counseling by CHILDLINE with the child, it was revealed that she was not interested in the marriage and desired to pursue her studies, CHILDLINE is following up to help her join a school and continue her studies.

CHILD TRAFFICKING

CHILDLINE RESCUES 12 MINOR CHILDREN FROM TRAFFICKING

CHILDLINE Ajmer received a call from a concerned citizen about 12 children who were being trafficked from Ajmer to Ahmadabad by Varanasi express. On receiving this call, the CHILDLINE team planned a rescue operation and immediately informed the Anti Human Trafficking Unit as well as the Government Railway Police (GRP) at Ajmer. Since this was a serious case the police officers in the GRP Thana were spurred to action and in a joint operation with the Railway Protection Force (RPF) the Varanasi-Ahmadabad express was raided within an hour. Aged between 12 to 17 years, the children were found in a weak and distressed state. They belonged to remote villages from different parts of Uttar Pradesh and all of them came from deprived families with meager economic positions.

Five traffickers were arrested through this operation. Initially they tried to dupe the officials by saying that they were the children's' guardians; however after much questioning they admitted to their crime. The traffickers, hailing from Gazipur district in Uttar Pradesh, were taking the children to sell them in Ahmadabad district of Gujarat for child labour. As a regular process, they took advantage of the poor economic conditions of these children's families and in the name of giving them better care and a promising future were selling them into the evil hands of child labour. The children were being taken to be engaged in menial jobs at tea stalls, small industries and as domestic help.

CHILDLINE Ajmer with the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) provided shelter to the children and after CWC's analysis, all the children were restored to their respective families. An FIR was registered against the 5 accused and the perpetrators were booked under section 374– IPC, 23, 26 of the Juvenile Justice Act. They were later produced before the Honorable Magistrate of the Court in Ajmer and are now in judicial custody.

MEDICAL AID

CHILDLINE ENSURES MEDICAL SUPPORT FOR 80 UNDERPRIVILEGED CHILDREN

The village of Singapur which is 24 kms away from Gairatganj Block has very poor infrastructure and the villagers there lack proper knowledge about health and hygiene. Owing to these problems, the children in this village have very low resistance levels and fall sick very often. Recently, a large number of children were suffering from conjunctivitis. Locals from the village informed CHILDLINE about this issue and the team rushed to the spot to survey the area. During their visit the team identified around 80 children below the age of 15 who were infected by conjunctivitis. After the initial outreach and looking at the agony the children were going through, the CHILDLINE members held a meeting with the adults in the village and drafted a letter addressed to the Block Medical Officer (BMO) asking him to organize a medical camp at the village. The villagers along with the CHILDLINE team then met with the (BMO) to discuss the predicament of the children and a medical camp was initiated. The Health Department of the block visited the village, conducted checkups for the children and distributed medicines to them for a speedy recovery. The doctors also informed the villagers about the do's and don'ts when it came to hygiene and explained to the precautions to be taken against conjunctivitis. Post the medical camp, all the 80 children were cured quickly and efficiently and they all got better within a few days.

EMOTIONAL SUPPORT AND GUIDANCE

While conducting an outreach programme in Sardar Bazar area, CHILDLINE members visited Takshashila Vidya Mandir in Satara where they met the Principal of the school and spoke to him about CHILDLINE. On hearing this, the Principal was very pleased to know about the CHILDLINE activities and informed them about 11 of his students who were forced to drop out from school by their parents because of various reasons. He requested CHILDLINE to provide counseling sessions to these students so that they could instill in them the urge to join school again. CHILDLINE team decided to take on this case and collected the address of all the 11 students so that they could go and meet them. During the counseling session, the CHILDLINE team spoke to the children and asked them why they had left school. Most of them said that they didn't have the money to pay the fees while some said that they were just not interested in studies. The team first tried to make the students understand the true value of education and its importance. They were also told about how schools help in providing a bright future to children by imparting knowledge and how they could have better opportunities when they grow older because of a good education. The children's parents were later roped in for the sessions and were explained about child rights, the Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan and how their children will be able to support them in the future by getting a good job after completing their studies.

After the session the parents informed the team that they will send their children to school and do their best to give them good education. The parents also promised CHILDLINE that they will make sure that their children study diligently and back them up whenever required. The next day the school Principal called CHILDLINE to thank the team for their counseling session and he also informed them that all the 11 children had come to school that day.

RUNAWAY CHILDREN

CHILDLINE REUNITES RUNAWAY CHILD WITH FAMILY

Ajay, a fourteen year old boy, lives with his family in Charup village in Gujarat. Charmed by a fair which was taking place in his village, Ajay stole Rs. 500 from his father's wallet and headed to the fair. The boy spent more than half the money playing at the fair and having snacks there. After realizing what he had done, he was petrified of the consequences and of his father who he thought would yell at him for spending so much money. Afraid of going back home, Ajay decided to run away and took off from the fair immediately. He arrived at Patan from where he got into a bus and went to Mehsana. From here he boarded a train to Ahmadabad where he reached at 10:30 pm. Lost and alone at the platform, Ajay was consoled by a stranger at the railway station who heard his story and took him to his house in Danilimda, Ahmadabad. The stranger sexually abused Ajay for one whole week. When the child got the opportunity he ran away from this house and reached Kalupur railway station where a CHILDLINE volunteer saw this boy in a frightened and nervous state. After inquiring with the boy and talking to him for some time, the volunteer took Ajay to the GRP to register his details. On counseling the boy, Ajay was still in a state of shock and was too traumatized to say anything. He was then asked to write down his journey from the village to Kalupur station. On reading his statement, the CHILDLINE team filed an FIR against the person who met Ajay at Ahmadabad station and Ajay was taken to a Government hospital for a medical checkup. Based on Ajay's description of the man who had abused him and other details which were given, the police arrested the perpetrator at Danilimda and he was booked under section IPC-323,IPC-377, POCSO-3(a),4,5(L). The accused was produced before the court and he is currently in judicial custody. Post the medical checkup, Ajay informed the CHILDLINE team about his father and gave them his contact number. The next day his father arrived at Ahmedabad and as per the order from CWC, Ajay was handed over to his father. CHILDLINE team is still in touch with Ajay and is constantly following up on his well being.

FRUITS OF CHILD LABOUR: CHILDLINE RESCUES 4 CHILDREN FROM RECYCLING UNIT

Four children were rescued from a recycling unit by CHILDLINE in association with Rajarajeshwari Nagar police in Bangalore. The children worked in a unit which was spread on over an acre in Rajarajeshwari Nagar and were illegally employed by Rajendra Prasad for plastic bag segregation, taken from open gutters. They were confined to the unit and were working under inhuman conditions for over four months. The rescued boys, all said to be aged between 12 and 14 years, were brought from Navadha district in Bihar and said that their employer had promised to pay them Rs. 3,000 per month, which he sent to their parents. After a tip-off on child labourers, the CHILDLINE team rushed to the unit. They found the children washing the segregated plastic covers in waste water which was highly polluted with chemical particles. The work area of the children was not visible as it was covered with sheets. The team eventually managed to enter the area through a small gate. Big plastic bags with chemicals were found inside and stink rose from the work area as the children had to wash the chemicals out of the plastic in dirty water. The children would wash the sheets in a storm water drain passing through the unit. Prasad would get huge bundles of plastic sheets from factories which were cut into pieces, washed and dried before being sold for recycling.

The team also discovered that the children were housed in an unhygienic shed adjacent to their work area that lacked basic facilities like electricity and clean drinking water. The children said that after reaching Bangalore, they were not allowed to go out anywhere and did not expect this kind of work. When they pleaded with the employer, Rajendra Prasad, to let them return home, he would shout at them. The boys worked 14 hours a day, from 6 am to 8 pm, and were allowed to bathe once in 15 days. Prasad provided grocery and the children cooked meals twice a day. Prasad would call their parents once a week and allow the boys to talk for a few minutes. That was the day the boys looked forward to.

The rescue team could not confront Prasad, as he had gone out. But the children provided information to the police based on which, appropriate steps will be taken by them. All the four rescued children were later produced before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) for further action. Throughout the journey to the CWC, the boys were peering out of the windows of the vehicle. They said that this was the first time they were seeing the city. The police are on the lookout for the employer, who is absconding and as per the instructions from the CWC, the children were sent to a rescue home.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

17 year old Anil was admitted to the civic hospital by the CHILDLINE Kolhapur team for a check up and to begin a medical and psychological counseling for him after he was found highly intoxicated under the influence of drugs. The boy was not willing to talk to anybody and it was extremely difficult to handle him. Anil lived with his mother who took on the responsibility of the entire house after her husband passed away. His mother sold petrol from her home and while helping his mother in her work Anil got addicted to sniffing petrol. On examining his condition, the CHILDLINE team spoke with Dr. Hamid Dabholkar and discussed Anil's case with him and his economic conditions. Dr. Dabholkar, being a kind hearted man, agreed to admit Anil in his deaddiction center at Sahyogi Parivartan Sanstha Satara for 3 months. When Anil completed his stay at the center he was totally transformed and developed into an able boy thanks to the counseling and other sessions at the center. All his neghbours, friends and relatives came to meet Anil and congratulated him on his new life. His mother was the happiest of them all as she hugged her son with tears in her eyes. Everyone had nothing but praises for Anil's

courage and his new found confidence. CHILDLINE Kolhapur is in constant touch with Anil regarding his health and education. As per his wish the team also admitted Anil to in Montfort Integrated Education Center in Nagpur for a 6 month vocational training. Today, Anil is free from substance abuse and is making plans for his future growth.



CHILDLINE CONTACT CENTRE (CCC)

The CHILDLINE 1098 service is a 24 hour free emergency phone outreach service for children in need of care and protection and the voice of every distressed child reaches us through the CHILDLINE Contact Centre (CCC). This is the central facility to which all 1098 calls are directed. The modern- day technology of a Call Centre was adopted by CHILDLINE in 2008 to provide a more systematic approach to Call Management and documenting.

CHILDLINE service needs to reach every part of the country. CHILDLINE uses contemporary technology to improve efficiency by using modern day technology of a Call Centre to provide a more systematic approach to Call Management and documenting. The voice of every distressed child reaches us through the CHILDLINE Contact Centre (CCC), a central facility to which all 1098 calls are directed.

The CHILDLINE Contact Centre (CCC) is a 24 hour voice response facility of CHILDLINE run out of a modern Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) facility. CCC answers calls at a national level, 24X7 from children in need of assistance. This service ensures that every child who calls 1098 is provided help through partners at the local level. CCC is staffed by CIF staff and the technology/infrastructure is outsourced to TCS.

HOW CCC FUNCTIONS

Once a call is received at CCC on 1098, it is answered by a trained CHILDLINE Contact Officer (CCO). If the call resolution can be completed on the phone it becomes a CCC operation. However in calls requiring Direct Intervention, the CCO will list the details and make an outbound call to the Collab Partner (the CHILDLINE Interventions unit) in the city where the call has come from. Then the Collab partner takes over and indicates to the CCC an estimated time of intervention and post the intervention, reports the complete case details to the CCC. This enables the CCC to complete the case documentation. Sometimes the caller speaks in a local dialect. In such cases the CCC facilitates a conference call with the local Collab partner.

In 2014-15, CCC was expanded from the existing coverage of North and West regions to cover South and East regions as well. Prior to the expansion, CCC was operating from one site in Mumbai with 18 seats. Today CCC operates 60 seats on a 24 hour basis across all four regions. The seats are split across 4 locations: Mumbai, which is split across 2 sites, services North and West regions, Chennai services South regions and Kolkata services East regions.

EXPANSION MODEL

Remote located Primary data centre in Mumbai and disaster backup secondary data centre in Chennai which is under testing.

Data Centre to host CRM software server, Call recording server, Genesys platform server, Data backup server. These are connected via MPLS (MultiProtocol Label Switching) Cloud to each CCC location.

CCC locations at TCS facility in each city is linked to data centers via MPLS cloud based connectivity.

Vendors includes: Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) for hosted solution model (data centres and MPLS connectivity) and for CCC facility in each city and Talisma for CRM software.

CHILDLINE PARTNER MEETS FOR CHANGEOVER

Chennai: completed for partners of all southern states on 7th/8th July.

Kolkata: completed on 24th, 25th and 28th September for all states of East/North east.

COVERAGE OF EACH CCC SITE

Mumbai CCC: all of North and West regions: J&K, HP, Uttranchal Pradesh, UP, Punjab, Haryana, Delhi, Rajasthan, MP, Gujarat, Maharahstra, Goa, Mumbai.

Chennai CCC: all 5 states of South: Tamilnadu, AP, Telangana, kerala, Karnataka, Pondicherry.

Kolkata CCC: all states of East: West Bengal, Orissa, Bihar, Chattisgarh, Jharkhand, Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Tripura, Nagaland, Mizoram, Arunachal Pradesh, and Andamans.









IMPACT OF CCC IN SOUTH AND EAST (2013 - 14 vs 2014 - 15)






YEARLY TREND: PERCENTAGE OF CALLS MADE AND ABANDONED FOR THE YEAR 2014-2015

CHILDLINE GOES BEYOND THE SERVICE

The year 2014-2015 witnessed a growth and advancement in CIF's communication tools, issue based projects, publications, media associations, corporate tie-ups and rigorous awareness programmes at the state and national level. Constant updates on social networking sites, interactions with our ever-growing database, media tie-ups and innovative awareness campaigns/events were accomplished.

ISSUE BASED PROJECT

CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE AWARENESS PROGRAMME (CSAAP)

CHILDLINE's Child Sexual Abuse Awareness Programme was launched in Mumbai in January, 2011. This programme uses a unique story telling format in schools to teach children in classes 2nd to the 6th the concepts of Safe Touch, Unsafe Touch and Personal Safety Rules. The stories are narrated by trained and certified lady volunteers and the sessions are followed by some classroom exercises and distribution of sealed letters to parents that explain more about the programme.

The CSSAP team covered more than 400 schools in the last academic year alone, 2014-15 including around 250 BMC schools and over 900 schools in all since the inception of the programme in 2011. The programme has reached out to 3, 60, 458 children till date.

Through various initiatives and tie-ups undertaken, CIF has trained almost 350 volunteers, with approximate number of 100 active volunteers working for this cause. The training workshops were held four times in the reporting period. These workshops include a detailed session on CSA on the first day – what constitutes as child sexual abuse, what are its indicators, types of CSA, what to do in case of disclosure, etc and covers communication skills on the second day.

CSAAP is currently working with several people from various fields to develop similar modules, targeting different age groups; pre primary, secondary school children and children with disabilities. Throughout the past year, the CSAAP team has taken extra efforts in conducting sessions for impaired children. With the help of pictures (characters from the story) and a sign language instructor assigned by the respective school, CSAAP team members have successfully conducted sessions. Schools like Disha Karnabadhir School, Mookhdwani Vidyalaya, Vatsalya Trust Orphanage etc have shown great interest in these sessions, so much so, that during the review, not only did the students answer, but also the teachers.

Simultaneously the CSAAP team also conducts CSA awareness sessions for teachers, for parents, for members of Housing Societies etc. Spreading information about CSA helps in the long run. CSA awareness sessions for parents or teachers of schools, not only makes them more aware of the current scenario, but interested candidates also go a step further and sign up to volunteer with the CSAAP team in conducting these sessions and making more children aware.

CSAAP has also started something unique in initiating a year-long tie-up with schools that are interested. The school dedicates one day a month to CIF/ Child Safety. In the past year, CIF has conducted various sessions for the children, teachers or parents of one such interested school - Green Lawns School, Breach Candy.

Starting from drawing and elocution competitions organized for the school children, the team has also organized interactive session with teachers and Justice Tulankar (Justice Tulankar specializes in dealing with POCSO cases and other cases related to Child Sexual Abuse), thus giving teachers an idea of the legal system put in place to deal with Child Sexual Abuse. In a similar instance, in the same school, another interactive session was organized with the children of classes 5th, 6th and 7th and Police Inspector Salunke and Asst. Police Inspector Shubdha More from Crime Branch, Mumbai Police.

Looking at CSAAP from a larger view point, it has recently expanded to the city of Bengaluru, where the Programme will commence from the next academic year i.e. 2015-16. Similarly, in another tie-up with CIF and Young India (YI), an initiative of Conferderation of Indian Industries (CIIA), the CSAAP team is initiating a programme called 'Project KOMAL', where YI members/ volunteers will be trained by CIF and will conduct CSA awareness sessions in schools in 37 locations across the country. Volunteers will first screen the video 'Komal' and then have a 10 minute review sessions with children about Safe/ Unsafe Touch and Personal Safety Rules.

CSAAP won the Gold trophy under the Best Social Responsibility Communication category at the Association of Business Communicators of India (ABCI) Awards, 2014. The programme also won the First Prize as the Best Public Service Campaign at the Public Relations Council of India (PRCI) Corporate Collateral Awards 2015.



CAMPAIGNS

WORLD DAY AGAINST CHILD LABOUR

Every year on 12th June governments, society and organizations focus their attention towards emphasizing on the plight of child labourers all over the world and taking efforts to eliminate the menace of child labour altogether. World Day Against Child Labour was incepted by The International Labour Organization (ILO) in 2002 to motivate everyone to fight against child labour and to make people conscious of the millions of children who work as paid or unpaid labourers and who are very vulnerable to exploitation.

CHILDLINEs all over India has observed this day through signature campaings, distributing pamhplets, street shows etc to alert people on the issue and strengthen them to raise their voice and 'Say No to Child Labour!'

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE CAMPAIGN

- CHILDLINE Betul organized a workshop on Child Labour at the Government Quarter Colony. The workshop focused on the ill effects of employing children and how education is more important.
- CHILDLINE Ahmednagar along with the Labour Department organized a rally with 300 slum children. Children
 were also given notebooks and pens and were encouraged to become responsible citizens of the country through
 education.
- CHILDLINE Surat collaborated with Sulochana Trust, BalJigar Trust, Shree Valand Yuvashakti Yuvak Mandal, the Labour Dept and the DCPU to hold a rally with 300 children. An enrolment and scholarship program for 800 children was also conducted.
- CHILDLINE Indore in a joint venture with the WCD organized a rally and poster exhibition at the collector's office. Participating in the event were District Administration Officers, police persons, media & social work students. The rally saw around 2000 participants covering the most child-labour prone areas.
- In Nagapattinam the District Collector issued a notice in the public bus stands and requested the public to call up 1098 if they come across any child labourer. A 1098 board was put up at the Women's Police Station which is located next to the bus stand. The RTO pasted 1098 stickers as well on government and private buses and autos to create mass awareness.
- In Mandla a group outreach was conducted at Hanumanji ward with the participation of around 50 children, Anganwadi helpers, teachers, local social workers and families living in the neighbourhood.
- CHILDLINE Ujjain organised a rally and signature campaign against child labour. Shopkeepers, coolies, auto drivers and several onlookers came out in large numbers to show their support. More than 250 people supported the campaign through their signature.
- CHILDLINE Lucknow organised a rally in the city with social workers, CHILDLINE volunteers and students of various schools. At the end of the rally CHILDLINE Lucknow organised a street play on Child Labour. In continuation, CHILDLINE Lucknow also organised a seminar on the issue at Assistant Labour Commissioner's Office with the Labour department, civil society organization, hotel and shop owners and the school students.

CHILDLINE Se Dosti has become an established nation-wide awareness campaign making ordinary citizens stakeholders in Child Protection. The aim is to acquaint the community to the concepts of Child Rights and Child Protection and make them pro-active in order to create a safe environment for children in the country. What began as a marketing attempt/donation drive in 2007 with the distribution of Dosti coupons is now a nation-wide awareness and fund-raising campaign. This initiative was proposed with the hope that with each person CHILDLINE meets, a new 'Dost' is made.

A week-long campaign from the 14th of November to 20th November, CHILDLINE Se Dosti aims at making friends ('Dosts') for CHILDLINE. In this endeavor to build dependable relationships for a safe and child friendly atmosphere, we spread awareness amongst those who remain unaware about the work done by CHILDLINE and as such create a week long national level visibility. 'Dosti Week' is packed with games for children, rallies, walkathon, workshops, outreach programmes, signature campaigns, visits, nukkad, nataks, sports days and many other exciting activities. This exhilarating campaign is for one and all irrespective of religion, gender, social status, income level, caste, age etc.

Each city and district in India was bustling with events during the week long Dosti celebrations. The year 2014 saw CHILDLINE Se Dosti grow exponentially as a large number of people from every nook and corner across the country came out to lend a helping hand as a CHILDLINE Dost and supported the celebrations with a positive attitude and immense exuberance.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE CAMPAIGN

SRINAGAR

A group of children staged a skit titled "Think About Me" (Meun Te Soonchtav) on Child Labour and children issues. The skit aimed to stop rampant child labour in Srinagar, it sent out a message that children should not work but must go to school.

GURDASPUR

Childline Se Dosti week saw a number of activities taking place in Gurdaspur from an awareness programme on drug abuse targeting students from various schools across Gurdaspur to a national Open Karate Championship organised in association with the District Child Welfare Council and Punjab Shotckan Karate with over 350 children.

SHIMLA

A mega Signature Campaign was organised by CHILDLINE Shimla at the Ridge Shimla to reach out to general public on CHILDLINE 1098 and Child Rights. Over 1500 people came forward and pledged their support on the occasion.

SOLAN

Over 30 children from the Kather migrant area in Solan participated in a special Children's Day festivities for the

first time ever to create awareness on CHILDLINE and various issues related to children. Toys, food and sweets were distributed to the children.

HARIDWAR

CHILDLINE Haridwar carried out an awareness programme on CHILDLINE 1098 to sensitise the Doctors and Nurses in Haridwar on child rights. The programme ended with the CHILDLINE team tying Suraksha Bandhan to all the participants and other staff in the hospital.

MUMBAI

To celebrate Childline Se Dosti week, a group of students from the Institute of Chemical Technology, Mumbai in collaboration with CHILDLINE Mumbai spread some unexpected joy through a flash mob at Juhu Beach. The onlookers, though confused at first, cheered on with great zeal. Later the CHILDLINE Mumbai team addressed the gathering on Child Rights and 1098.

KHANDWA

Children in Khandwa tied Suraksha Bandhan to Police personnel to thank them for their continuous support. This symbolic action was of importance as the Police are the first official force that runaway children may come in contact with.

SILCHAR

Over 100 students bunched together for a rally from various schools across Silchar to spread awareness about CHILDLINE and child rights and protection. Organised by CHILDLINE Silchar, officials from District Adminstration, NGO workers, CHILDLINE team, Teachers and staff from schools took part in the rally.

RAIPUR

CHLDLINE Raipur held a special programme where 4 children along with the CHILDLINE team met Mr. Balramji Das Tandon, Governor of Chattisgarh and tied him a Suraksha Bandhan, thanking him for the support to CHILDLINE 1098.

GUNTUR

Childline Se Dosti campaign in Guntur saw the release of Childline Se Dosti poster by Mr. Kantilal Dande, IAS, Collector and District Magistrate, Guntur. A day long workshop to sensitize media personnel on Child Rights and Child Protection was also held. The workshop saw over 25 reporters from Print and TV media and news photographers take a day out from their schedule to participate. The workshop aimed to sensitise media personnel on child sensitive reporting; how to maintain ethical standards in telling sensitive and taboo stories to protect the rights of children.

HYDERABAD

Making a difference during the Childline Se Dosti celebrations in Hyderabad was the CHILDLINE Walkathon, an

initiative by CHILDLINE Hyderabad in association with Crime Investigation Department (CID), Telanagana to raise awareness on Child Rights and Child Abuse. Ms. Sania Mirza, Indian tennis player and Brand Ambassador for Telangana State flagged off the walkathon in the presence of Mr. Ajay Mishra IAS, Principal Secretary Homes, Telangana State, Mr. Anurag Sharma IAS, DGP, Telangana State. Over 6,000 college and school students from various Government and Private schools & colleges along people from various walks of life including officials from District Administration, Police Department, Labour Department, CWC and JJB members, NSS & NCC students, Media representatives and CHILDLINE team participated in the CSD walkathon organised as a part of CHILDLINE Se Dosti celebrations.

WARANGAL

CHILDLINE Warangal organized a health camp focusing on children & women's health issues. The camp was beneficial to over 800 underprivileged children and women.

MADIKERI

CHILDLINE Madikeri organised a Legal Camp on The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012 for the members of CWC, DCPU, DMO from Madikeri at the Government High School Madikeri. The camp saw over 50 officers take a day out from their schedule to participate.




DELHI BIRTHDAY PARTY

It is imperative that proper guidance, corrective treatment, education and healthcareprovidea child a chance to reform. It is the responsibility of the community and state to provide these facilities to a child in order to increase the possibility of a better life. Instead, children are sent to remand homes, observation homes where they are subject to various forms of abuse. How then is a child supposed to grow up normal if provisions made for him/her lead him to further crime?" He emphasised that most children have hope for reformation. With adhering to current juvenile justice laws, we give our children hope for a better life.





E-MAILERS AND E-NEWSLETTERS

CHILDLINE send out e-mailers and e-newsletters to all its Dosts to keep them updated on the latest happenings at CIF. Accessible to the impaired and user friendly in design, these hi-tech mediums are used to keep our supporters in the loop immediately. Emailers are aso sent to spread Diwali greeting and Christmas cheer among our special Dosts.

CIF sent out 3 eNewsletters and 4 eMailers for the financial year 2014 – 2015.





CHILDLINE was awarded the prestigious 5th National Centre for Promotion of Employment for Disabled People (NCPEDP)-Mphasis Universal Design Awards 2014 under Category C: Companies / Organisations for its exemplary initiatives in the area of accessible & inclusive media. CHILDLINE has won this award for making the animation films: 'The Rose', 'Like Sisters' and 'Education Counts' as well as the website, eNewsletter and eMailer accessible to the impaired. The animation films have been developed in accessible formats which include: Captioning, Sign language interpretation and Audio description and each accessible format has been created in Kannada, English and Hindi.

CHILDNET

ChildNET volume 8 was published in 2014. It presents an in-depth analysis of calls received on 1098 and interventions carried out for the period January, 2012 to December, 2013.

The total number of intervention cases reported by ChildNET was 73,121 for 2012 and 1, 08, 379 for 2013. CHILDLINE nationally received a total of 39,04,285 calls in January 2012 - December 2012 and 38,83,722 calls in January 2013 – December 2013, including 2,11,950 information calls in 2012 and 2,12,457 information calls in 2013. These calls consists of caller's seeking information about CHILDLINE and services for children such as adoption services, vocational training courses, boarding homes, child guidance clinic and so on. The data provides important feedback about the impact of the service, users of the service, the reasons for calling CHILDILNE, experiences of abuse faced by children and the nature of intervention provided by CHILDLINE. It provides the building blocks for more in-depth research and analysis on the status of children in India, particularly in the area of child protection. It is important to note that this publication analyzes only the intervention related calls recorded in ChildNET.

PROFILE OF THE CHILDREN ASSISTED

The data highlights that for the two years CHILDLINE reached out to

- Maximum number of children in the age group of 11-15 years (44%)
- Higher number of boys (62%) than girls (38%)

ChildNET showcases the nature of calls, the nature of intervention, the profile of callers, the status of callers and the status of the CHILDLINE service in India.



POCSO POSTERS

Keeping in view the recently passed Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012, CHILDLINE released two posters that cover important aspects from the Act. While one poster speaks about the different kind of abuse patterns and the punishment for committing the crime, the other poster details out the concept of Child Protectors and their role in safeguarding child rights. Both the posters have been translated from English into 14 Indian languages.

TATA POWER EMPLOYEE GIVING

Two day event on employee giving was held in the premises of TATA Power on 12th and 13th of March 2015. The CSR unit of TATA Power had put up a wish tree with pledges towards the Tata Volunteering Week in collaboration with CHILDLINE India Foundation. The wish tree enabled the employees to contribute to the cause of child rights. As the employees gathered in the display area, the representatives of CHILDLINE India Foundation distributed CHILDLINE brochures and personally spoke with the employees making them aware about CHILDLINE 1098 services.



UNINOR

Uninor and CHILDLINE pulled off a combined anti-child labour day drive in Gurgaon, Kanpur, Lucknow, Varanasi, Noida, Faizabad and Gorakhpur. During this drive various communication mediums were used to make the general public aware about the evils of child labour. Uninor raised about Rs 4.77 lacs to support the education and rehabilitation of children rescued from child labour.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Under the school programs, 586 schools in 47 cities were contacted. CHILDLINE interacted with about 75,000 students in about 100 schools through assemblies, class room exchanges etc. Special events such as shelter home engagement programs were organized in some of the schools to provide school students an understanding of children who get displaced, how they cope etc.

PIMPRI CHINCHWAD EDUCATION TRUST'S S.B.PATIL PUBLIC SCHOOL

A one day interaction program was organized for the children from Girls' Observation Home, Pune, on 13th September, 2014. A total of 38 children along with their two teachers and care takers were escorted to the school campus by the School Coordinator. They were warmly ushered into the auditorium and after presentation of flowers and the customary welcome were treated to an entertainment program. The children from the home also presented some interesting items including a poetry recital. The event was followed by a movie show for the children.

Then they were escorted to the cafeteria for lunch. Later in the day, the children took part in various activities like drawing, music, dance etc. The closing session saw exchange of ideas, sharing of experiences between the students of the school and the children from the home. Komal wins the heart of many! 'KOMAL' shines at 62nd National Film Awards as Best Educational Film 2014!



CHILDLINE 's 'Komal' won the prestigious National Award in the Best Educational Filmz category at the 62nd National Film Awards 2014 for effectively and concisely communicationg essential information to children to protect themselves from sexual abuse. Renowned animation film maker, Mr. Kireet Khurana and his team from Climb Media who developed the animation film received the coveted award at the 62nd National Film Award ceremony held at Vigyan Bhawan in New Delhi.

'Komal' is India's first film that explains how child sexual abuse happens and what needs to be done if such a situation occurs. Targeted at children between 6 to 12 years and their parents/teachers, every element of the film was researched and also vetted by a child psychologist. Using a story in animation format the film depicts the process of targeting, grooming of the child by the adult offender, the abuse, the feelings of guilt and confusion in the minds of the child victim and the dilemma in the minds of parents. The latter half of the film covers training on Safe and Unsafe touch and Personal Safety Rules for the child.

CHILDLINE intervenes to help victims and ensure offenders are punished. In 2014, CHILDLINE handled over 2500 child sexual abuse cases. Unfortunately not many adults are open to talk about the difference between Safe Touch and Unsafe Touch with their children. A common but rarely talked-about scourge of society the sexual abuse of children is often neglected and ignored by most adults. Additionally many fail to realize that children are abused often by those they place their trust upon.



To prevent such an incident, CHILDLINE developed 'Komal'. The film is now being shown in various schools and children's groups so as to sensitize children in a calm and composed approach. 'Komal' aims to spread awareness among parents, teachers and other care givers as well as to engage the community to empower children to differentiate between a good touch and a bad touch.

Conceptualised by the Communication and Strategic Initiatives team at CHILDLINE India Foundation and created by director Kireet Khurana and his team at Climb Media, 'Komal' has become a nation-wide phenomenon, reaching out to more people every day across shores. The film has been released in 15 languages- English, Hindi, Marathi, Gujarati, Konkani, Tamil, Telugu, Malyalam, Kannada, Odiya, Bengali, Assamese, Punjabi, Kashmiri, and Urdu. Along with these 45 accessible versions for each of the 15 languages have been created with Sign language windows, with supers and with voice overs- these accessible films are meant for speech/hearing and sight challenged persons.

With over 4.5 million views on YouTube, a viral on WhatsApp and over 80,000 shares on Facebook, this 10-minute film in a short span of time has made a positive impact on many. Requests have also been pouring in from different countries like Nepal, Philippines, Indonesia, Bangladesh, Mongolia, Indonesia, Malaysia, Sri Lanka, Tibet, Singapore, Afghanistan, Saudi Arabia, Iran and more to make 'Komal' in international languages as well so that children all over the world can benefit. The United Nations High Commisoner for Refugees (UNCHR) has formally requested for an international track of 'Komal' so they can dub it locally for their refugee camps in many parts of the world. It is evident that Komal touches a chord amongst people across the world.

Komal has been featured on various news channels and on across social media in many countries. It is widely used for screenings at housing societies and theatre groups in many cities in India. Over time, 'Komal' has been recognized at various platforms nationally and internationally. The film was awarded the FICCI Best Animated Frames (BAF) Award in 2014 under the Animated Short Film - Professional (International) category. It was also recognized as the official selection for the 8th edition of Psarokokalo International Short Film Festival in Greece and the Animarte Festival, 2014 in Brazil.



GRAPHICAL OVERVIEW


CHILDLINE PARTNERS AND CIF GOVERNMENT OF INDIA GRANT RECEIPTS

Total Government Funding: Rs 5362 Lakhs




CIF INCOME ANALYSIS

Significant Accounting Policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India and the applicable Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India
 - All Income and Expenditure items in the financial statement are recognised on accrual basis except of grant & donation.
- b) Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes all expenses relating to acquisition and installation of these assets. Fixed assets acquired out of the amounts received from donors towards specific projects are charged to the relevant project and accounted in the Fixed Assets schedule at a nominal value of ₹1 with a corresponding entry in sundry receipts of the same amount. Assets received free (as donations) are carried at nominal value.
- c) Depreciation is charged as per the method and rate as per the Income Tax Act, 1961. Depreciation on fixed assets has been charged to the Income and Expenditure Account
- d) Assest purchased below Rupees Ten Thousand are expensed out during the year.
- d) Donations received for restricted revenue funds are taken to the 'Funds and Liabilities' in the Balance Sheet. Expenses incurred are disclosed under the head "Expenses on the Objects of the Trust" with an equivalent amount disclosed under the head "Transfer from Earmarked Funds" in the Income and Expenditure Account. Amount received towards purchase of Fixed Assets, are shown under 'Earmarked Funds' and expenditure incurred, if any, will be debited to such earmarked fund.

Schedule 'L'

Notes To Accounts

- a) Block Grant received from the Government of India and recorded as liability at the time of receipt, is disbursed to Partner Organisations on the basis of signed agreements between Childline India Foundation and Partner Organisations.
 - The liability is reduced by disbursements made/payable to Partner Organisations. The expenditures of Partner Organisations are certified by professional accountants. The Management of Childline India Foundation relies on these utilization certificates which form the basis of accounting.
- b) Fees payable to Charity Commissioner amounting to ₹45,56,416/- for the years ended 31st March 2009 to 2015 has not been paid, as the authorities under instructions of the Bombay High Court are not collecting the fees.
- c) With effect from 1st August 2012, the Governing Board of the foundation has established a Staff Welfare Fund for the benefit of employees with an initial contribution of ₹25 Lacs by transferring the said amount from the Income & Expenditure Account.
 - Going forward, as per the decision of the governing board, 10% of the annual surplus would be transferred to the Staff Welfare Fund, subject to a maximum annual contribution of ₹10 Lacs.
- d) Previous year figures are regrouped wherever necessary to conform to this year's classification.





CHILDLINE INDIA FOUNDATION (CIF)

The CHILDLINE service, which has been developed and managed by CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF), is a 24x7, emergency, free phone outreach service linking children in need of help and protection to organisations run by government departments as well as those run by civil society agencies. Children or concerned adults dial the number 1098 and are connected to the CHILDLINE service in their city.

Street children and youth living alone on urban streets, child labourers especially in the unorganized sector, children who have been abused, child victims of the flesh trade, differently-abled children, child addicts, children in conflict with the law, children in institutions, mentally ill children, children affected by HIV/AIDS or other long term diseases, children affected by conflicts and disasters, child political refugees, children whose families are in crisis, gender linked abortion of female foetuses, undernourished children, illiterate children are among the host of issues plaguing children in India.

As of March 2015, CHILDLINE operates in 316 cities and/towns across the country and services over four million calls a year.

CHILDLINE is India's first national level response to the ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). Additionally, the CHILDLINE 1098 service receives special mention in the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection) Act 2000 - the Government has requested CHILDLINE to act as a catalyst in bringing together State agencies and voluntary agencies at the local level to ensure implementation of the Act.

The Government of India cites the CHILDLINE service as part of services to UN for the United Nations Convention of Child Rights commitments. When the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD) came into being in 2006, it recognized CHILDLINE India Foundation as the Nodal Mother NGO for implementing the CHILDLINE model across all districts in India. Furthermore in order to put in place a process framework for the implementation of Child Protection, CHILDLINE joined hands with The National Institute of Social Defence and developed a program: 'National Initiative for Child Protection (NICP)'. This has subsequently become the framework for the MWCD - initiated Integrated Child Protection Scheme program (ICPS). The Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS) of the ministry funds the expansion of CHILDLINE services and has targeted the end of the 12th Five Year Plan to cover all 600+ districts of India.

OBJECTIVES OF CHILDLINE INDIA

- To reach out to every child in need of care and protection by responding to emergencies on 1098 and by physically reaching out to children.
- To adapt and integrate telecommunication technology, linking all districts to the service of 1098, and making it available to all children in need of care and protection.
- To provide a platform of networking amongst organisations and to provide linkages to support systems that facilitates the rehabilitation of children in need of care and protection.
- To work together with the Allied Systems (Police, Health Care, Juvenile Justice, Transport, Legal, Education, Communication, Media, Political and the Community) to create child friendly systems.

CHILDLINE India Foundation _______

- To advocate for services for children that are inaccessible, non-existent or inadequate.
- To create a body of NGOs and Government organisations working within the national framework and policy for children.
- To be a nodal child protection agency in the country, providing child protection services to children in need of care and protection.
- To contribute and work towards strengthening and participating in a global movement that addresses issues related to child protection and ensures that children's voices are heard.

PROGRAMMES AND ACTIVITIES

- Responding to calls on the national toll free number 1098 and provision to rescue and offer emergency outreach services for children in need of care and protection;
- Coordinating rescue and other outreach services with the help of relevant local departments like police, administration, labour, health, railways and others;
- Ensuring proper documentation of all children rescued to facilitate their rehabilitation and restoration, where necessary;
- Producing children before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) to ensure care and protection.
- Supporting the CWC in the long-term rehabilitation of children, where required.
- Supporting a national network for the tracking of missing children.
- Providing data related to children rescued and rehabilitated for the compilation of a national comprehensive database of child protection.
- Creating awareness and ensuring access to the 1098 Child helpline (CHILDLINE) number.
- Creating research, documentation, awareness and advocacy on issues related to the Child helpline.
- Establishing linkages with other child protection services, community and local bodies to meet the immediate needs of children rescued.

THE CHILDLINE MODEL

CHILDLINE is a unique partnership between the Government of India, Department of Telecommunications, voluntary agencies, academic institutes, the corporate sector, children and the community.

THE PARTNERSHIP MODEL OF CHILDLINE INDIA

CHILDLINE is the crucial link between children in need of care and protection and the available services. For children with different needs, who call in anytime, anywhere, and for anything, we act as a one-point contact, which facilitates instant access to support, advice, active intervention or just a listening ear. We connect children in emergency on one end of the phone line to a well-connected network of services - services that already exist. No new shelter, no new hospital, no new infrastructure is built.

We at CHILDLINE believe that for a helpline to be successful and effective in reaching out to the millions of children deprived of their childhood, we need to work in a partnership framework. A framework that recognizes that:

- A helpline cannot operate in isolation
- All partners involved in the helpline share a reciprocal relationship
- Each partner has clear and definite roles in the partnership model. This leads to a feeling of joint ownership towards the model.
- All partners share the vision, mission and the success of the model

THE OPERATIONAL STRUCTURES AND PROCESSES OF CHILDLINE INDIA

CHILDLINE CONTACT CENTRE (CCC)

CCC is a 24 hour, centralized voice response facility of CHILDLINE using contemporary BPS (Business Processes Services) technology at Vikhroli in Mumbai. The CCC is a continuous operation and tracks all calls coming in including those that land at the switch but are either terminated or 'abandoned' before a CCC member can answer it. CCC uses contemporary CRM software for real time data analysis and currently services all cities in the North and West regions of India

NODAL ORGANISATION

The nodal organisation is usually an academic institute or Non Government Organisation with networking, training, coordination and research skills. A city coordinator is supervised by the Nodal Director who ensures creation of a protective environment for children at the city level.

CHILDLINE India Foundation ______

EMERGENCY INTERVENTION CENTRES - COLLAB PARTNERS

The Emergency Intervention Centres are voluntary agencies, which shall function as the intervention units for CHILDLINE. CCC responds to calls that are received on 1098 and transfer the case to the collab partner who carry out the intervention process. The centre coordinator manages a team that intervenes in emergency cases and conducts outreach and networking activities.

CHILDLINE SUPPORT AGENCIES/SUB-CENTRES

CHILDLINE Collaborative Partner is also called the Collaborative Centre. There are, approximately, 5 to 7 Sub-Centres in districts (and 1-3 support agencies in cities) as per the specific need in the district/city, according to the nature of the population and geographical spread in the district. A team of three CHILDLINE staff members assisted by two volunteers from the Mahila Samakhya members, anganwadi workers, teachers, and woman members of the panchayat assist the Sub-Centre staff at the taluka and village levels. They will follow up on children who have returned to the village and provide information when children are being recruited and help the local community to prevent child labour.

CHILDLINE ADVISORY BOARD OR DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE (DAC)

CHILDLINE Advisory Board or District Advisory Committee (DAC) is headed by the Collector and other members include the District Officers for Health and Education. Major NGO like Mahila Samakhya and others stimulate the development of the programme in the district.

RESOURCE ORGANISATIONS

Resource organisations act as centres for referral by CHILDLINE. They include the various organisations and institutions that provide services for children or work on children's issues. They also participate in outreach and awareness programmes for CHILDLINE.




