LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. INGRID SRINATH

2012-13 was the year child protection issues grabbed the attention of the Indian public as never before. Unfortunately, that attention was triggered by tragic, often brutal, attacks on women and children that evoked outrage across the country. The scale and savagery of the ongoing tide of violence our children are being subjected to made headlines and saw the issue put squarely on the national agenda. It also prompted an increase in reporting across the range of child protection issues, to police and other authorities, by the media, and by individuals and organisations calling CHILDLINE. In a year characterized by shock and horror, this was one of the few positive developments. Disappointingly, the spotlight did not result in any significant change in the budgets, policies and systems that determine the safety and well-being of our children.

For CHILDLINE the year meant huge increases in demands for our services, expertise and engagement with no commensurate increase in resources – human, financial or infrastructural. Network size expanded sharply with 73 new locations and 95 new partners. Call traffic increased by 70% over the previous year. Cases grew ever more complex, demanding far greater knowledge and expertise from our teams especially in legal and psycho-social domains.

Besides our core services - responding to calls to 1098 with information, advice, emotional support and physical intervention, when necessary - CHILDLINE focused on enhancing the reach and effectiveness of the Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS) through 151 workshops and 70 in-house training programmes for various stakeholders including our partners, other NGOs and community based organisations, the Police, members of Child Welfare Committees, Child Labour Task Forces, Special Juvenile Police Units, Juvenile Justice Boards, Anti-Human Trafficking Units, Child Protection Units at village, district and state levels, ICDS workers, ASHAs and ANMs, officials at the Department of Labour, school personnel including principals, teachers, counsellors and inspectors, staff at shelters, homes, orphanages, hostels and hospitals as well as judges, magistrates and advocates. Each law better understood, entity activated, circular issued, signage added, process institutionalized, or staff member sensitised represents progress towards realizing the potential of the vision for India's children embodied in the ICPS.

Valued support for CHILDLINE's mission came from volunteers, donors, businesses and the media. Without these contributions we would scarcely reach the numbers of people we do, or find the resources and partnerships that foster innovation, efficiency and effective delivery of our services. Beyond our own borders, collaboration and peer-learning with child helplines in South Asia and around the world through our global network, Child Helpline International, enriched mutual knowledge and solidarity.

Despite all this sterling work we are deeply conscious that much, much more remains to be accomplished if we are to meet our goal of ensuring every Indian child is protected from abuse, exploitation and discrimination and can reach out for solace, protection and rehabilitation. Achieving this is possible with adequate resources – financial, human and infrastructural. Each harrowing headline – from mid-day meal tragedies to children forced to labour for a living and from the inadequacies of our juvenile justice system to child marriages, trafficking and unnecessary death demands an answer to the question of why this is not our topmost priority as a nation.

Thank you for your support in closing that gap.

ACTIVATING STAKEHOLDERS IN CHILD PROTECTION

CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) aims to strengthen and systemize Child Protection in India through its collaborative/collective efforts with the Government of India, State Government and Civil society organizations in order to make children's issues a priority on the national agenda. CIF also believes in catalysing learning 'on the ground' through its far reaching partner network. It is through learning and discussions with our partner organizations that CIF develops universal programmes and protocols towards an effective Child Protection practice.

EAST

MEGHALAYA

Over the last couple of years it had been noticed that due to the presence of coal mines, mostly in the regions of Jantia hills and Garo hills of Meghalaya, prevalence of child labour was rampant. Moreover based on frequent reports from the office of National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR), there had been an urgent need to draw up a concrete plan to prevent practices of deploying child labour in those areas.

Meghalaya is one of the states in North East which has constituted a State Advisory Board (SAB), chaired by the Chief Secretary. CHILDLINE was invited by the SAB to give valuable inputs in fighting the menace of child labour. It was recorded in the SAB meeting that a District level Committee on Child Welfare cum Rehabilitation and a district task force on child labour be constituted in all the districts of Meghalaya. The task force in coordination with CHILDLINE will rescue and rehabilitate children with utmost care.

DIMAPUR

CHILDLINE conducted a one day workshop under the National Initiative for Child Protection (NICP) in Dimapur at the Prodigals Home Resource Centre for the various NGOs and stakeholders. The workshop dealt with the topics of Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2000, Juvenile Justice Board/Child Welfare Committee, child rights, issues and case studies as well as the responsibilities and procedures of the Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU). The role and functioning of CHILDLINE was also explained so that participants could have a deeper understanding of the legalities involved in child issues.

DIBRUGARH

To tackle the issue of employment of child labour with meagre wages, a Child Labour Task Force was initiated by CHILDLINE Dibrugarh along with the Labour Department. Since the inception of the Task Force a total of 48 child labourers were rescued during the year.

ODISHA

A meeting with the Odisha state government officials culminated in some critical decisions. Open shelters for children will be



set up across the districts in the state through joint consultation between CHILDLINE, State Women and Child Development (WCD) and CHILDLINE partners in Odisha state. Important locations will be mapped to set up open shelters for children across the districts in the state, through joint consultation between CHILDLINE, its partners in Odisha and the State WCD. The state will also ensure setting up/renovating existing Special Homes for Children with special needs, mentally ill and physically challenged. A very crucial aspect in these decisions included the membership of CHILDLINE in all child related bodies like District Child Protection Committee (DCPC) and the District Child Labour Task Force.

KAILASHAHAR

The District Administrator of Kailashahar as well as CHILDLINE realized that a vast portion of the district remains unaware of the CHILDLINE services for children. Therefore CHILDLINE Kailashahar organized a workshop on child protection inaugurated by the District Magistrate. Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) workers and Panchayati Raj Institution (PRI) members were sensitized on child rights.

This initiative was jointly taken up by the allied system and CHILDLINE to spread the reach of the service so that unreported cases are referred in the centre and grass root realities of the vulnerabilities of children are attended to effectively.

MANIPUR

Training for the newly appointed officials of the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) and the Juvenile Justice Board (JJB) was proposed by the Social Welfare Department. With a view to impart quality training, the Department decided to invite CHILDLINE members as resource persons in the training program. The objective was to train the CWC & JJB members so that redressals of cases are promptly done and they are made aware of all aspects of legal intervention for children.

The training focused on child rights and laws, child sexual abuse and the Right to Education (RTE). A film on child sexual abuse was shown for a clearer concept and subsequently a group discussion was held to discuss the various topics.

SOUTH

WARANGAL

The District Collector of Warangal issued a circular to form committees that will monitor child marriages in the village, involve active participation in preventing child marriages, include compulsory registration of marriages and distribute all appropriate registers and formats to the marriage officers.

MANDYA

A district level Child Marriage Jatha was organized by CHILDLINE Mandya in coordination with Department of Women and Child Development (DWCD) and District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) of Mandya

Child rights and prevention of child sexual abuse was the theme for the two workshops conducted by CHILDLINE for the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) supervisors and school counsellors. Since the ICDS supervisors were also incharge of 'Balsabhas' and in contact with adolescent girls, they were motivated to hold camps at the Panchayat level to build awareness on the issue.

GULBARGA

Anganwadi supervisors were made aware of the Child Marriage Act and the need for prevention of child marriage in their respective communities. As a result the district CHILDLINE is seeing an improved support from this group as well as there has been an increase in the cases being reported by them.

PALAKKAD

Multi-allied systems were made aware of child sexual abuse and the need for prevention and effective reporting. A large number of Junior Public Health Nurses (JPHN) from the National Rural Health Mission (NRHM) were included as part of the trainings which helped to cover almost 1800 functionaries as a ripple effect of several trainings thereafter.



PUDUKOTTAI

A workshop on child exploitation for district officials resulted in a beggary drive and rescue of many bonded labourers.

SALEM

Salem district, having several interventions on child marriage, had a multi stakeholder workshop. The workshop has helped to increase the cooperation from the Village Administration Officers, Grama Sevikars and Revenue Inspectors. Increased reporting has also been observed through this workshop.

NAGAPATTINAM

A workshop for police personnel has helped in getting the police to cooperate in anti begging raids in Velankanni and membership of the district CHILDLINE in anti trafficking task force at the district level. Also increasingly, police are speaking about the role of CHILDLINE in their programmes across the district.





The High Court of Kerala stressed the need for CHILDLINE 1098 facilities in all schools to address the increasing incidents of Child Sexual Abuse.

A Division Bench of the High Court of Kerala stressed the need to establish CHILDLINE 1098 facility in all Educational Institutions in the State in the wake of increasing incidents of sexual abuse of children. The High Court of Kerala highlighted the need to further promote the activities of CHILDLINE in every school to help check sexual abuse by the near and dear ones at home. The bench comprising Justice T. R Ramachandra Nair and Justice AV Ramkrishna Pillai observed that CHILDLINE activities would protect and promote the welfare of children.

The Bench made the observation while upholding a verdict of a court awarding life imprisonment and a fine of Rs. 50,000 to a Kannur resident for raping his minor daughter. The prosecution's case was that the accused had sexually abused his minor daughter for more than five years. He had abused her from 2002 to 2008. The court noted that the timely intervention of the teacher had unearthed the sexual abuse and with the help of CHILDLINE activists the victim lodged a complaint before the Juvenile court.

WEST

AHMEDNAGAR

The District Social Welfare Officer issued a circular to the Superintendents/Rectors of the Aided Hostel President at Ahmednagar regarding smooth functioning of hostels in which it has been specifically mentioned that permission and assistance should be given to CHILDLINE members to provide information about child rights, child related problems & CHILDLINE 1098 to every child residing in a hostel.

GUJARAT

Inspector General of Police (Women Cell and Crime), Gandhinagar issued a circular to the Director, Social Defense Department, Gandhinagar to inform that the police department, has formed a missing children squad in each city/district of Gujarat and that the department would spread CHILDLINE 1098 awareness across Gujarat.

MUMBAI

Mumbai CHILDLINE received a circular from the police to paste CHILDLINE posters at 93 police stations across Mumbai

SAGAR

Chief Medical Health Officer, Sagar issued a circular to Government hospitals, civil surgeons & Primary Health Centres stating to provide medical assistance and free treatment to cases referred by CHILDLINE Sagar

BHOPAL

An awareness programme was organized with the auto drivers and coolies of railway stations in Bhopal by CHILDLINE. The objective was to orient them about 1098 and inform them about how they can use the service to help children who end up at railway stations and other public spaces with no place to go. Due to this awareness program Bhopal CHILDLINE now has four volunteer groups from the Auto Sangh and two groups have been formed by the local coolies.


NORTH

UTTAR PRADESH

One of the undisputed highlights of 2012 in terms of advocacy with the government structure was the major breakthrough with the Labour Department. The Labour Commissioner of U.P acknowledging CHILDLINE's role in the rescue and rehabilitation of child labourers directed all the district labour commissioners' and assistant labour commissioners' to permit the local Protection Scheme wherein CHILDLINE will participate as an active member in the district child labour task force.

HARYANA

Representatives from CHILDLINE met with the Director General Women & Child Development, Government of Haryana and discussed about the role of Child Welfare Committees (CWC) and the need for licensing of children homes under the Juvenile Justice (JJ). As a result orders were issued for awarding licence under the JJ.





ADVOCATING ON CHILDREN'S ISSUES

Advocacy on Child Rights and Protection forms one of the core pillars of CHILDLINE's efforts towards a child-friendly India. Advocacy and networking initiatives are practiced from the Village Panchayats to the State and Central Government level. Recognition on behalf of these bodies allows for easy implementation of child helpine services across the country. These developments have significantly contributed to CHILDLINE's growth in each district/state.



REHABILITATION OF RESCUED CHILD LABOURERS

As a follow up of last year's advocacy on 'Legal aspects of Child Labour', the focus for this year was on the 'Rehabilitation of rescued child labourers' by CHILDLINEs in Tamil Nadu. The advocacy plan was formulated with the following objectives;

- Sensitizing the allied systems and the community on prevention of Child labour to ensure a child friendly state
- Strengthening the existing mechanisms to address child labour at the district/state level
- Ensuring rehabilitation of rescued child labourers

A questionnaire was developed to assist the cities within the state in conducting the survey on child labourers in all CHILDLINE operated districts. The survey was done in 18 districts where CHILDLINE is present. An analysis was done and the assessment of the consolidated report was presented in the State Level Partnership Meet, an annual event where representatives of all CHILDLINEs in the state come together. Looking into the interventions done in the previous years, it was felt that there was a need to capacitate the CHILDLINE teams to focus more on the rehabilitation of child labourers.

- The Meet focused on the rehabilitation of rescued child labourers through building networks and linkages.
- Representatives from Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), National Child Labour Project (NCLP) and an NGO (Thozhamai) shared their roles and the provisions available in their programmes to rehabilitate child labourers. A panel discussion was held which enabled the participants to clear their doubts with regard to the practical difficulties faced by the CHILDLINE team during interventions.

As an outcome of the training, many CHILDLINEs have enrolled children in schools citing the RTE Act. The families of rescued child labourers are also linked to government schemes for livelihood programmes, pensions and other benefits and a circular was issued to all District Collectors in Tamil Nadu to include CHILDLINE in the District level Task Force on Child Labour.

OUTCOMES

- ✓ In the past one year, 542 child labour interventions were carried out by the different CHILDLINEs across Tamil Nadu
- An announcement was made in the Tambaram railway station on CHILDLINE and child labour by Chennai CHILDLINE. Awareness songs and street plays were performed. A signature campaign was also organised.
- A programme was organised jointly by CHILDLINE and Hewitt Company at the IT sector in the Olympia towers, Guindy to create awareness on CHILDLINE and child rights among the employees.
- ✓ Anti Child Labour Day Awareness Road Show was organised by CHILDLINE and Hand in Hand in Kanchipuram. Anti child labour oath was taken by 250 government staff in the Collectorate. The road show was flagged off by the District Revenue Officer from the Collectorate. All major areas of Kanchipuram town were covered.
- A documentary on child labour was shown to school students by CHILDLINE Madurai. A road show was conducted, various competitions were held and winners were given prizes and certificates.
- ✓ Virudhunagar CHILDLINE conducted awareness programmes for police, Child Welfare Officers, SHGs, Intergrated Child Development Services (ICDS) workers and in schools.

BALPANCHAYAT

CHILDLINE Khandwa has initiated the formation of 'Balpanchayat' wherein children will participate as members and meet with the local Parishad and discuss their needs and requirements.

CIF receives award for Anti Child Labour efforts

CHILDLINE was awarded by the Labour Karnataka as the best organization serving Karnataka. The efforts were appreciated for rendering service in the field of Child Protection and Development. The award function held at Bangalore was presided by the Honourable Chief Minister of Karnataka and the Honourable state minister for Labour.





VILLAGE PROTECTION COMMITTEE

CHILDLINE Berhampur selected 5 villages to form a Child Protection Committee (CPC) in their operational areas. CHILDLINE was responsible for facilitating the process of formation and building the capacity of the committee, while the villagers created their own funds and also the Panchayat mobilized their own resources for setting up child protection mechanisms in their community. CHILDLINE with the help of the Panchayat functionaries and CPC created a data base of all the children. This list has been given to the child protection committees based on which weekly reviews of the children are carried out on their well being and present state of affairs.

CHILDLINE State Advisory Board was set up in states of Bihar, Meghalaya and Mizoram to address issues pertaining to CHILDLINE and child protection concerns in the respective states.

WORKSHOP IN RAIPUR

CHILDLINE Raipur participated in the state level three days workshop organized by the CID, Chhattisgarh on Anti Human Trafficking Cell. The workshop dealt with issues of trafficking in Chhattisgarh, causes and remedial measures, role of police in combating the menace and role of CHILDLINE.



Child Protection Everywhere

Advocacy with the Education department in Madhya Pradesh and State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (SCPCR) resulted in a circular issued by SCPCR to all the Superintendents of Police for wall painting of important nos. like 100,1098,1091 etc. The Bhopal District Police has already complied with this Circular.

COMBATING CHILD MARRIAGE

Child Marriage was the theme of an awareness strategy taken out by various cities in Andhra Pradesh. Knowledge on disadvantages due to child marriage was spread among Mandal samakhyas and CBOs during meetings and to the general public through other awareness programmes. SHGs were also given special training on the importance of not getting their daughters married off before the age of 18. A number of theme based mass awareness activities were organized in the form of Kalajathas Rallies, puppet shows and exhibition of stalls in different Jatharas. Many leading Telugu print media published articles on reasons for existence of child marriage, its consequences, legal provisions and a few case studies of children rescued by CHILDLINE. These efforts have yielded good results in the form of sensitizing the rural parts of the state on the issue. Special programs on child marriage were also telecasted on ZEE News, Gemini News and NTV with the efforts of Warangal and Ongole CHILDLINE directors. Vulnerability mapping on child marriage issue was prepared by 15 CHILDLINE's across the state. This helped the other Government departments to focus more on the problem of child marriage and to implement the preventive strategies in advance.

OUTCOMES

- ✓ A total no of 360 cases were reported in the state during the period 2012 2013
- ✓ District Collector Warangal has given a circular for sensitizing Thahsildars and CDPOs on child marriage
- ✓ Visakhapatnam District Educational Officer (DEO) has given a circular to all head masters on providing age proof certificate from all schools (Govt/ZP/Mandal parishad/TW/Aided/Pvt) for verification during child marriage cases by CHILDLINE
- ✓ District Educational Officer Vizianagaram has given a circular on providing age proof certificate and formation of CHILDLINE clubs in all schools (Govt/ZP/Mandal/TW/Aided/Pvt) to ensure participation of children and reporting violations of child rights
- ✓ Women and Child Development (WCD) Chittoor directed all the Child Development Project Officers (CDPO's) to cooperate with CHILDLINE during the child marriage interventions.

Protection to sexual abuse victims all the way

A unique initiative was undertaken by the CHILDLINE team in Delhi to anchor the process of coordination for victim support in sexual abuse cases. Under this initiative children will be escorted to the Kakardooma court, prepared for the court hearing and towards better representation and testimony in the case.

SENSITIZATION WORKSHOPS WITH ALLIED PARTNERS

Our commitment and priority towards Child Protection is critical to the creation of a protective environment for our children. There is a dire need to ensure that Child Protection is understood and practiced by all who are stakeholders in ensuring the rights of a child. Catalyzing allied systems including the Police, Health Care Organizations, Education Institutions, Transport Undertakings, Telecom, Media, NGO's who have a large stake in Child Protection is vital to a more sensitive and proactive society.

The NICP (National Initiative for Child Protection) is one such need based initiative implemented at a nationwide scale. These sensitization and awareness workshops are carried out in every CHILDLINE city with our allied systems, addressing children's issues with a rights based perspective. These workshops are conducted with support from NIPCCD (National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development)

CIF designed a curriculum that would be incorporated into various trainings undertaken at a local level. A series of dialogues on children's issues have been initiated through this platform. The following is a summation for 2012 – 2013.

Circular for activation and accessibility of 1098 in Aircel mobiles in Rayagada District, Odisha





REGIONAL PARTNERSHIP MEETS OF CHILDLINE PARTNER REPRESENTATIVES

EAST

The 14th East Zone Regional Meet at Puri, Odisha was inaugurated by Mr. Santosh Kumar Das, Deputy Director, In-charge of Child Welfare, Women & Child Development, Government of Odisha. The Guests of Honor were Mr. Sarat Kumar Misra, Chairperson, District Legal Service Authority, Puri District who drew the participant's attention to the legal aid services for children which existed in all the districts and Ms. Kasturai Mahapatra, Commissioner-cum-Secretary, Persons with Disabilities, Govt. of Odisha, who expressed the necessity for establishing long term safety measures for child protection in collaboration with all other support systems available. Ms. Chitrakala Acharya, Head — Services, CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF), Mr. Debashish Rath, Director, CHILDLINE Collab, Puri and Mr. Sandeep Kumar Mitra, Head, Eastern Regional Resource Centre (ERRC) were also present.

The inauguration was followed by two days of workshops for the 141 coordinators / team leaders from the East Zone. After a common session with a zonal presentation and the new CHILDLINE formats by Mr. Mitra the participants were divided into 4 groups – i) North East, ii) West Bengal, iii) Odisha and iv) Bihar/Chattisgarh/Jharkhand, each group having different interactive sessions conducted by external and internal resource persons – on child rights and laws, child counselling, improving coordination in call referrals, case intervention, importance of documentation, media violation, etc.

Following the coordinators/team leader's workshops, Mr. Rath inaugurated the Meet for the team members with 125 participants. After a common session with the zonal presentation and the formats, the team members here were also divided into 4 groups with each group having varied sessions on topics such as – gender and sexuality, sexual violence against children, handling child abuse cases, communication, effective outreach, call classification, case identification etc.

SOUTH

The Regional Meet of all the CHILDLINE coordinators and team members of the South Zone was organized in Kanchipuram district. The theme of the meet was child sexual abuse. Another important session of the meet was about the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act (POCSO) which was handled by CIF Representative Mr. Thomas T.A. This session was helpful in giving an understanding about the sections, procedures and guidelines mentioned in the new act.

Another session on CHILDLINE linkage with homes focused on supporting the coordinators and team members to reach out to children in homes to understand their issues and situations. The session involved discussions on the indicators of child friendly practices in homes that could support the team to have a better understanding while conducting the visit. Based on the sharing at the meet the city CHILDLINEs scheduled visits to children's homes in their monthly plan, each city was able to visit minimum 2-3 homes every month. The visits helped to enhance children's relationship with CHILDLINE.

As a result of the regional meet the knowledge of the coordinators and team has increased which ultimately helped to book a number of child sexual abuse cases under the POCSO sections. Further to the meet many cities initiated the awareness programme on the POCSO Act for police personnel, members of the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) and teachers.

WEST

The 14th Western Regional Partnership meet for the West Zone was held at Lonavala from the 2nd to the 6th of Oct, 2012. This was for the team members and coordinators of the CHILDLINE partner organizations from the sates of Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Maharashtra and Goa. The meet concentrated on the capacity building of the participants with reference to their knowledge, skills and attitude, on various child protection issues in relation to the implementation of the CHILDLINE service. Specifically the issues of (a) Child Labour, (b) Child Sexual Abuse and (c) Child Marriage were dealt with. These issues were identified based on the study of the calls received by the respective cities and discussions held with the State In Charge, City



In Charge, City and Centre coordinators and team members.

Although the same content was covered at both the team members as well as the coordinators meetings the depth to which each of the topics were dealt with differed greatly. With team members the sessions were more hands on and emphasis was placed on procedures and protocols to be followed while intervening in such cases. With coordinators who through our internal assessment were found to have satisfactory knowledge about the basic procedures and processes emphasis was placed on dealing with exceptional cases, understanding loop holes in the law, procedures, processes and understanding best practices. Special attention was given to capacitating coordinators to overcome practical difficulties.

Exclusive sessions were conducted on Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS). The sessions consisted of sharing the progress of the implementation of the ICPS scheme in the various states of the zone and discussing the various strategies to work in coordination with the ICPS structures at the state and especially the district level such as State Child Protection Society (SCPS), State Child Protection Unit (SCPU), District Child Protection Society (DCPS) and District Child Protection Unit (DCPU).

NORTH

The 14th Northern Regional meet for Coordinators saw Smt. Deepak Kalra, Chairperson, Rajasthan State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (RSCPCR) addressing the participants. She stressed upon the need for awareness of children's right to protection against all forms of violence.

The Regional Meet at Ajmer was a break away from the monotony of the usual trend followed in the past. First two days of the regional meet, i.e, from 29th Oct, 2012 to 30th Oct, 2012 were exclusively for the team wherein creative activities were set up like comic strip making, drawing sessions, story writing and the like. A theatre activity was also done wherein members had to use this innovative medium in an appealing manner inorder to spread awareness about Child Protection and Child Rights as well as the role of CHILDLINE. This activity aimed at developing communication skills, boosting confidence levels, and improving voice modulation as well as over all presentation skills.

The following days of the meet witnessed active participation of coordinators in the sessions covering a plethora of child protection issues taken by eminent and highly skilled resource persons with a practical working experience on child rights and child protection over many years. The newly joined coordinators were oriented on the basic concepts of rights based approach and the importance of engaging stake holders in child protection while the senior coordinators, on the other hand, were challenged to inculcate new perspectives of child protection in their cognition.

The regional meet came to an end with the chief guest congratulating the CHILDLINE family for their commendable work.

HAPPENINGS ACROSS THE COUNTRY

EAST

SAHARSA

CHILDLINE put up a stall at the Kosi Mahautsav organised by the Government of Bihar and inaugurated by the Chief Minister of Bihar, Mr. Nitesh Kumar. This Maha Utsav in itself is a famous festival of the Saharsa District. Through this event, CHILDLINE Saharsa made the local community aware about CHILDLINE and its services.

SANDESHKHALI

Impoverished villages of Sandeshkhali in the Sundarbans are notorious for trafficking girls in the name of providing work as domestic help, construction workers, etc. In every village, an average of six girls are found missing. Locally known as 'agents' or 'contractors', the traffickers target impoverished, vulnerable families, pay them meagre amounts of money and hand their daughters to placement agencies. Unaware of what lies ahead of them, some of the girls are sold to city brothels and music bars and some are sold as domestic workers or as brides to states with a low sex ratio. Minor boys from here are sold for bonded labour to small manufacturing units in UP, New Delhi and even Kolkata.

To educate the locals about this menace, a Legal Awareness Camp was organised at Sandeshkhali. The Chairman of the West Bengal State Women Commission (WBSWC) was present at the camp as a resource person and delivered a valuable speech on trafficking and the laws related to this crime. The District and Block administration officers as well as police officers and local leaders were also present. Prof. Sarfaraz Ahmed Khan, from The National University of Juridical Sciences, talked about the special laws and their implementation processes at the camp. Mr. Sandeep Kumar Mitra, Head, East Regional Resource Centre, CIF shared various case studies and also the role of CHILDLINE in combating child trafficking. Along with the

esteemed guests, children from various schools also participated in the programme. More than 2000 villagers were present at the camp and took an active part in the sessions conducted.

HOWRAH

An awareness programme was organized by CHILDLINE at the Bally Jagacha block. The President of the Zilla Parishad, Ms. Chaitali Debnath and the Panchayat Samiti members attended the programme. The programme began with a session on what CHILDLINE is and the services rendered so far. A puppet show was organized by CHILDLINE to entertain the children who had come from 35 primary schools of the Bally & Belur blocks. Through the puppet show information about the CHILDLINE number 1098 and details about the CHILDLINE services were provided so as to capture the attention of the children. Later there were various interactive sessions conducted to explain topics like child labour, child marriage and child trafficking. At the end of the programme a magic show was organized for the children. A total of 165 students, 35 teachers and 100 guardians attended the programme.

DARBHANGA

A women's rally was organised by CHILDLINE Darbhanga with an aim to involve women to give out messages about CHILDLINE and its activities to the community. This was done to enforce the fact that to combat child related problems at the community level, women can play an important role to protect children. Nearly 200 community women participated in the rally and every one of them took the oath to fight against any form of abuse or violence against children in the society.

GUWAHATI

To encourage the initiative against Child Labour, a rally was organised by Guwahati CHILDLINE with the participation of the Chief Minister of Assam. A talk show was also organised and aired by Red FM.

AIZAWL

Law enforcers play a big role in civil protection mechanisms. As such a Programme on Child Friendly Police Station was organized at Aizawl Police Station by CHILDLINE along with the Mizoram Police, Mizoram State Child Protection Society, and the Center for Peace and Development. The objective of the programme was to sensitize and strengthen the police personnel about their roles in working with children and to make the police stations a child friendly environment.

The Member Secretary, Child Welfare Committee (CWC) & Superintendent, RITC were also present and provided information about the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2000, the Amendment Act 2006 and ICPS functionaries. The programme ended with a tour of the police station where the children were guided by the Officer in Charge of the Aizawl Police Station who explained the services and showed the different cells at the police station.

SOUTH

CHILDLINE Kochi in association with the District Administration, Education Department, National Rural Health Mission and the District Council of Child Welfare organized a CHILDLINE meet for CHILDLINE Ambassadors belonging to the Ernakulum, Aluva, Moovattupuzha and Kothamangalam Educational Districts in Kochi, Kerala. The primary objective of this meet was to orient the ambassadors on child rights, the CHILDLINE service and their duties as ambassadors.

The meet saw participation from over 200 schools in the educational district. CHILDLINE Ambassadors were accompanied by one teacher per school. Therefore, there were a total of 400 CHILDLINE Ambassadors and 200 teachers participating in the meet.

Once the CHILDLINE Ambassadors were inducted, it was the duty of students to play a role of spreading awareness on CHILDLINE within their schools, referring children to CHILDLINE in case of emergency needs of children, imparting information on different issues such as Child Labour, Child Sexual Abuse etc and creating additional ambassadors for CHILDLINE.

MADURAI

A 2 day training of Child Rights Protectors was organised by CHILDLINE Madurai for officers of various departments at the Collectorate in Madurai. Mr. Anshul Mishra, District Collector, Madurai inaugurated the programme. Speaking on the occasion, Mr. Anshul called for complete eradication of Child Abuse in all forms in the Madurai district. The primary objective was to create awareness amongst schools; teachers and parents about Child Abuse, Child Rights and Protection. Over 400 participants from various departments such as Social Welfare, Police and Education in addition to the Nehru Yuva Kendra, Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), Self Help Groups and the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), took part in the training in different batches.

KOZHIKODE

CHILDLINE Kozhikode drew a campaign against substance abuse and addressed the issue of drug abuse prevalent amongst children with the objective of creating awareness on the harmful effects of drugs and alcohol amongst children. Shri M.K. Raghavan, Member of Parliament, Kozhikode inaugurated the campaign which included 'K a l i k', a day long study camp to sensitize children. Shrimati K.C. Rossa Kutty, Chairperson, Kerala State Vanitha Commission inaugurated the camp.

CHILDLINE Clubs were formed by CHILDLINE Calicut in schools to make children aware of their rights and safeguard them from any kind of abuse. "Children are not safe even at their homes. Strengthening of vigilance councils and opening CHILDLINE Clubs in all schools across the district could help to ensure the safety of children," said R. Sasi, Vice-President, District Panchayat, Calicut at the district level launch of the CHILDLINE Club and empowerment programme for Jagratha Samithi. Over 100 students and several teachers attended the programme at the Regional Science Centre and Planetarium in Calicut. Awareness sessions were held in connection with the programme to inform children about their rights.



IDUKKI

CHILDLINE Idukki conducted a workshop for school bus, taxi and auto drivers on safety measures while dealing with children and how to make travelling comfortable for children. Mr. V.N. Saji, Deputy Superintendent of Police (DYSP), Munnar inaugurated the workshop and CP. D. Mohanan, Circle Inspector (CI) Munnar presided over the function.

WEST

MANDASAUR

CHILDLINE Mandsaur recognized that many children in the area were out of school because of various reasons like financial conditions, not enough family support etc. To benefit these children CHILDLINE initiated an evening school, 'Masti ki P at ha'sntinglida@colony with the help of a local sponsor. Apart from imparting knowledge like any other regular school, this school also teaches children basic life skills, provides information on child rights, child protection, health and hygiene.

PRABHANI

Around 200 children, police personnel and social workers participated in a rally which was based on the theme "PROHIBIT OR STOP CHILD LABOUR AND EDUCATE CHILDREN". Shop keepers and the general public of the city were involved in the rally held by CHILDLINE through street plays, social awareness songs and slogans.

BHOPAL

With an objective to create awareness among people and ask them to come forward in cooperation on the issue of "Child Sexual Abuse" CHILDLINE Bhopal took to the streets in the form of a campaign titled "Say no to Child Abuse". A bike rally with 60 college students and volunteers was initiated by CHILDLINE and supported by various other NGO's like Angan Trust, Bitiya club, OASIS, SWANS and others. A candle march supported by Tulir, an NGO from Chennai was also carried out on the streets of Bhopal.

BARODA

A signature campaign on "Save the Girl Child" was carried out with gynaecologists of major hospitals and clinics in the city by CHILDLINE Baroda on the occasion of National Girl Child Day.

MUMBAI



Mr. Krishna Prakash, ACP, South Mumbai and Dr. B G Shekhar, DCP Law & Enforcement were the chief guests at this event.


NORTH

Mrs. Rajpal Kaur Dixit, Joint Director, WCD, Rewa & Shahdol division chaired the meeting. Members of Child Welfare Committee, Superintendent and officials from the Observation Home and Children Home participated in the meet.

SAHARANPUR

Saharanpur CHILDLINE in collaboration with the District Legal Aid service organized a legal literacy camp at block level to generate awareness of the 1098 service and activities

NOIDA

CHILDLINE conducted training workshops for more than 300 police personnel including members of the SJPU's and AHTU on Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection) Act 2000.

CHILDLINE Noida also organized a district level consultation on "Anti-human trafficking" where resource organization partners participated.

SHIMLA

A one day medical health camp was organized wherein 134 children were checked and provided medical treatment during an outreach activity.

AMBALA

CHILDLINE Ambala coordinated a one day orientation which focused on chapter II and III of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection) Act 2000. Dr. K.P. Singh IPS ADGP (Prisons) conducted a training session on the Juvenile Justice Act at Conference Hall in the Vita Milk Plant. Police Personnel, Members of JJB & CWC Ambala were present during the training. CHILDLINE Ambala shared success stories and explained the steps to be taken in case a child is lost and the responsibilities of police personnel and the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) were highlighted in such a situation.

ALIGARH

To mark the International Missing Children's Day, CHILDLINE Aligarh organized a signature campaign to sensitize the public on the issue of missing children. The signature drive saw huge participation from the general public, Anganwadi workers and Peer Educators of the Urban Health Initiative project. A memorandum was submitted by CHILDLINE to Mr. Piyush Mordiya IPS, Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) demanding that action must be taken and an FIR must be immediately filed on cases of missing children. CHILDLINE requested the SSP to instruct the officials for making it mandatory to file FIRs for missing children in the district.

DELHI

A training programme on dealing with cases of Bonded Labour in addition to an induction on Child Rights & Protection was carried out for the Deputy Commissioners and Sub Divisional Magistrates of the Government of NCT, Delhi at the Conference Hall of the Divisional Commissioner's Office. The training organised by CHILDLINE India Foundation saw 50 officers taking a day out from their hectic schedule to participate in the training.

ACTIVITY ACROSS THE BORDER

CHILDLINE members attend workshop held by Child Helpline International in Sri Lanka

Ms. Sreoshi Patranabis and Ms. Jaya Sophia represented CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) in the South Asia Outreach and Community based Strategy Workshop organized by Child Helpline International (CHI) in collaboration with the National Child Protection Authority (NCPA) and Don Bosco Lama Sarana in Srilanka.

THE VOICE OF INDIA'S CHILDREN

Child participation involves encouraging and enabling children to make their views known on the issues that affect them. Given the genesis of the CHILDLINE service, its identity continues to be linked to a deep-rooted vibrant relationship with children.

'Involvement, respect, best interest of the child, access to information, expression and empowerment' are some of the key aspects that come to mind when we think about what the concept of Child Participation means to CHILDLINE. Similarly, being a 'facilitator, listening to Children, acceptance and accountability' are some of the requirements that emerge while envisioning our role in the process of enabling children to meaningfully participate.

The conviction of CHILDLINE's belief that, when children are heard and involved, systematic changes would impact their lives positively has grown even stronger over the decade of its service.

CHILDLINE holds Children's Meets regularly which aim at creating a formal space for children to raise their issues and concerns. These meets bring children and members of different allied systems on a common platform whereby the issues can be raised and addressed and advocacy for positive change in public service can be articulated.

Tools of Child Participation within the realm of CHILDLINE:

OPEN HOUSE

CHILDLINE has put child participation in practice through 'Open House' sessions. It is a monthly feature at CHILDLINE, wherein children share their feedback on the CHILDLINE Service and other issues concerning their life situations, therefore gaining a deeper understanding of the issues and concerns, with children, during the course of the year. It also serves as an



opportunity to share the positive encounters between children and functionaries of the allied systems, like the police, health personnel etc. This helps not only in giving insights for improving the service, but also in building a relationship of trust with the children

Open House happens across different towns and cities across India according to the need of the hour and the convenience of the children. Child participation has been ingrained into the routine functioning of CHILDLINE at every level of interaction with our children.

INTERVENTIONS THROUGH OPEN HOUSE

- As a result of the open house conducted, CHILDINE Kota, Department of Education and the Rotary Club have agreed to open a temporary school in the basti for underprivileged children
- An open house conducted in Kolar brought to the fore front the problems faced by the girls residing in a government girls hostel in Bangarpet taluk. The girls complained that they were facing scarcity of water. This issue was settled by the efforts of CHILDLINE Kolar along with Social Welfare Department and the taluk Panchayath. Within ten days a new bore well was placed in the vicinity of the hostel
- In Villupuram, during an open house programme, the children gave information about a 14 year old boy who was working in a tea shop. The boy was rescued and enrolled in school.
- In Shivamoga, many slum children were suffering because of common health problems. A health camp was organized in collaboration with the Department of Health and the Government Hospital to treat the children







CHILDREN'S CLUBS

Another feature at CHILDLINE is the creation of Children's Clubs within schools, communities and villages. It is a Child Participation tool, for the children by the children themselves.

Children volunteer as members of the CHILDLINE Club and appoint CHILDLINE Ambassadors from amongst them. This forum is where children are able to express the issues faced by their peer group in the society. These Clubs are monitored by teachers, parents and CHILDLINE team members. The objectives of these groups are multifold:

- To address child rights and protection within various spheres
- Create a network between children and CHILDLINE
- Promote leadership qualities among CHILDLINE Ambassadors
- Better co-ordination between CHILDLINE Clubs and CHILDLINE for informing children's issues in the society









SOME ILLUSTRATED EXAMPLES OF CHILDREN'S CLUBS

Subhadra from Tanganapalli village in Berhampur, Odisha has had more than her fair share of hurdles to jump since she lost her two hands in a burnt injury. She experienced discrimination from villagers, relatives and even from friends. There were instances at times that her disability has made it hard for her to make friends in the village. With the support of Children's Club, she battled against prejudice in the village. Fortunately, the Children's Club formed by CHILDLINE Berhampur instilled in her a feeling of self-worth and a belief in the power of Children's participation. "There is a need for awareness at home, in the community, and throughout the country about people with disabilities which reduces the stigma," says Subhadra.



Shweta is just 13-years old and is an active member of the Children's Club formed by CHILDLINE. This young girl who hails from Kuarmunda, Sundargarh district participates regularly in the meetings of the Children's Club. Ever since, she decided to start raising awareness on various issues related to children from her school and community. "I live with my parents in a remote village near a hill called Kalosiria in the Kusit with the children's group. Ilearnt alot about my rsays Shwwesa.as a chil "Parents sometimes show a bias among their girl and boy children. Earlier my parents did not allow me to go out except for their work. The Children's parliament gave meanopport unity told my parents to allow me to play in the afternoon like my brother. I got the courage to ask them to play as I learnt it from my children's cadre training at CHILDLINE. Now I play in the afternoon with my group. Earlier, they would ask me to use borrowed books, but now I ask shhaældho. "I be innegwabno to his to be or rofity is elfth," I dan amazing experience. I have become more confident, people show me respect when they know I am a member of the Children's Club. I really feel empowered and have a strong role to play in creating change in the situation of children in my vill paints Gents' Shweta. "Last year, I participated in trainings carried out by CHILDLINE which have developed my skills for advocating for the rights of the children in my village and I have learnt about Child Rights and Child Protection.

I feellam knowledge ableand more informed about protection.

During a recent Children's Parliament session in Rourkela, Shweta confidently asked the representatives about the need to provide supplementary nutrition in the form of a cooked, nutritious meal to children in the age group of 3-6 years. She supported her questions with examples to show the real situation of children.

The CHILDLINE service is available to children in 277 cities / districts across 30 States / UT's in India, through a well - integrated network of 553 partner organizations


CHILDLINE 1098 initiates dialogue with children in need of care and protection and acts as a tool for change in the Child Protection arena.

CIF not only plays the role of listening to the voice of the child, but also plays the role of strengthening, molding and filling the gaps of existing National Child Protection Mechanisms.






INDIRECT INTERVENTION CALLS







GENDER OF CHILDREN ASSISTED




AGE DISTRIBUTION OF CHILDREN ASSISTED

RESPONDING TO CHILDREN IN DISTRESS

In India, CHILDLINE is a phone outreach based intervention model and the work begins when a call for help comes in. As soon as this happens, local CHILDLINE teams swing into action for direct intervention. Intervention covers a range of actions from rescuing children from abusive circumstances, providing immediate SOS attention, to registering a case at the police station, presenting a child to the CHILD Welfare Committee (CWC) in the city and developing the papers for onward action as directed by the CWC and so on.

Each case is unique in nature. Some take less than an hour to resolve whereas others take months of work. CHILDLINE's operational model involves the team activating a variety of linkages among the allied system institutions such as the Police, Municipality, Health Care, Education and Transport Institutions along with the Judiciary, Child Care NGO's, Local, State and Central Governments. Very often, the team has to provide unique solutions that require a relevant interpretation of legislations such as the Juvenile Justice Act and others, and sensitise allied institutions on issues.

2012-2013 was no different from the previous years. CHILDLINE received over a thousand calls from worried parents, sensitive adults, the community, well wishers and the distraught children of India. The below mentioned interventions / cases are a mere drop in the ocean of the work done by the CHILDLINE team.

CHILD MARRIAGE

CHILD MARRIAGE OF A TRIBAL GIRL AVERTED

Pampa Pahan was a 15 year old tribal girl from West Bengal. A bright student of class IX, her father, Baidyanath Pahan was a daily labourer and her mother, Laxmi Pahan, a house wife. Hailing from very poor conditions the family's monthly income was around Rs. 2000 only. Her father, the only bread winner of the family, was fending for Laxmi, Pampa and her four sisters.

Giving in to their destitute conditions Pampa's father decided to get her married. A strong willed Pampa adamantly rebelled against her father's decision as she was keen on continuing her studies. Despite all of her efforts to persuade her parents, the girl was left with no option but to give in and accept the proposed marriage.

A person named Arun Sarkar called 1098 and informed CHILDLINE about Pampa's impending marriage. On receiving the call, CHILDLINE visited the girl's family. After thorough investigation, a complaint was lodged with the District Social Welfare Officer who was also the Child Marriage Prohibition Officer (CMPO). The CMPO, on his part, informed the matter in writing, to Balurghat Police Station. Following intimation from the appropriate authority, the concerned officials of Balurghat Police Station & CHILDLINE jointly intervened to prevent Pampa's marriage from taking place.

After prolonged discussions, persuasion and counselling by the CHILDLINE team, Pampa's parents, relatives and the neighbours were convinced about the consequences of child marriage and as a result, the team was successful in stopping the marriage. Furthermore, Pampa's father gave a commitment that he would not arrange his daughter's marriage till she attains 18 years of age. Now Pampa is continuing her studies and plans for a prosperous career.

CHILD LABOUR

A LARGE NUMBER OF CHILD LABOURERS RESCUED IN A SINGLE OPERATION IN KARNATAKA

A shocking total of 42 children, aged between 6 to 17 years and working in hotels, bars, restaurants and lodges in Gandhinagar and Upparpet areas in Karnataka, were rescued in an operation conducted by CHILDLINE. Of them, seven boys were less than 14 years of age. Another two children, aged less than six years, were found begging in the area while the rescue operation was being carried out.

The remaining 33 children, including a girl were all aged between 12 and 17 years. Most of them said their family members had dropped them off to work at these places due to dire poverty. These children were earning between 3,000 and 4,000 per month and were forced to work in the most miserable conditions. When the raid took place only 42 were found out of the 63 children who were earlier identified by the team. The rest of them fled the scene once the rescue operation began. While a majority of the children were from surrounding areas of the state, there were five children each from Bihar and Tamil Nadu and one each from Assam and West Bengal

The Upparpet police have registered cases under Section 3 of the Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986, sections 23 and 26 of the Juvenile Justice Act, 2000 and section 374 of the IPC against the owners of the establishments that employed the children. The task was carried out jointly by officers from the Child Welfare Committee (CWC), CHILDLINE and the Upparpet police.

The Child Welfare Committee (CWC) has provided the minors' shelter at the children's homes and the CWC members are collecting details on their background along with the whereabouts of their families so that they could be safely sent home.

DOMESTIC CHILD LABOUR

SWATHI'S STORY

12 year old Swathi lost her parents at a very young age and was living with her uncle in Andhra Pradesh. Naïve as she was, her uncle brought her to Hyderabad to work as a domestic labourer in a businessman's home. Swathi was sold by her uncle to the businessman for Rs. 50,000/- which she was told was to be given to her once she turned 18.

Vulnerable and helpless, Swathi was forced to do all the household chores from 5 am to 12 am with no breaks or rests in between. To add to her plight, her employers restricted her every movement and made the girl stay at home at all times. They used to physically beat the child if she did not complete her work on time or according to their liking. Battered and bruised on a regular basis, her employers would serve her leftover food from the previous day. Being aware of her distress, a concerned adult informed CHILDLINE about Swathi. On receiving the call, the team verified the facts and visited the house where Swathi worked. When CHILDLINE reached the place, Swathi in old, ragged and dirty clothes was in the kitchen washing the utensils. It was evident that the girl was physically weak and distraught. On interacting with the girl, it was understood that the girl needed help. After Swathi narrated her story and the problems she was facing in the house where she was working, CHILDLINE along with the Deputy Commissioner of Labour, Hyderabad brought Swathi to the CHILDLINE office, offered her counselling and recorded her statement. The Child Welfare Committee (CWC), Hyderabad was informed about Swathi and her situation and as per their directions the girl was sent to the Government Home for Girls in Hyderabad. Swathi was again brought before the CWC, and based on what she told them they directed the Labour department to file a case against the employer. Swathi is now in KGBV hostel in Srikakulam where she is happy and continues her education.

MISSING CHILD

THE CASE OF MAHMUDA KHATUN

On September 26, 2012 at around 6.30 p.m. officers from Naharkatia Police Station called CHILDLINE, Dibrugarh to inform them about a girl of around 11 years who was found loitering alone at Sassoni Bus stand in Naharkatia. She was brought in by the local public at 5.30 p.m. to Naharkatia Police Station. The police officers arranged for the girl's medical examination the same day and the next day she was handed over to CHILDLINE.

Alone and aloof, the girl whispered to a CHILDLINE member that her name was Mahmuda Khatun and that she was originally from Nagaon. The girl further spoke about her family, her father who was a labourer in a rice mill, her mother Muslima Khatun and her two younger brothers. She said that her paternal aunt had brought her to work as a domestic maid in Dipu's house in Sivasagar. Mahmuda stayed at his place for 4 days and was later brought to Dibrugarh to stay with Dipu's borther-in-law, Kamruz Zaman in Naliapool. While she was seeping, Mahumuda dreamt that her father had expired. A frightened Mahmuda was missing her home and her family and the next day she ran away from Zaman's house. Mahmuda got into a bus in the hope of reaching home, but she reached Naharkatia instead of Nagaon. While recounting these incidents, Mahmuda expressed her wish to go back to her own house and stay with her own family. Mahumuda's case was immediately presented before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC). The girl was produced before the CWC along with her father, paternal aunt and Kamruz Zaman. The CWC ordered Zaman to open a National Saving Certificate (NSC) with an amount of Rs. 10,000/- for the welfare of the child. She would be allowed to withdraw the amount when she attains 18 years of age. Granting her wish, Mahmuda Khatun was restored to her family.

CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE

DRONE FOUNDATION CASE

Based on the information received from a child rights activist, Ms. Bharti Sharma, CHILDLINE Gurgaon filed a complaint with the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) against Drone Foundation which runs a home for children. The NGO faced a very serious allegation that the children residing in the home were sexually abused by one of the staff members. On further inquiries it was found that some of the children were HIV positive. An enquiry team headed by Bharti Sharma was set up by the NCPCR and a spot visit was conducted at the home. During the raid 14 HIV positive children were rescued and counselled thereafter. While counselling, two children revealed that they were sexually abused by the NGO Staff, Ankur Gupta. The very shelter home which was supposed to provide care and protection to innocent children turned



into a house of horrors. The children insisted that they had disclosed the matter to the President of the organization, Sunita Gupta, but instead of taking any immediate action she in turn reprimanded them.

Taking cognizance of the matter on the basis of the statements given by the children, an FIR was filed against Ankur Gupta who was absconding for some time when he was finally arrested following the statements of two girl victims, aged 9 and 12. The medical report of the girls confirmed sexual abuse. While the 12-year old girl was found to be HIV+, the other victim did not have any infection at the time of the medical test. The accused was also HIV+.

In an exemplary example of fast justice delivery the additional district and sessions judge Vikram Aggarwal found the prime accused guilty. Ankur Gupta has been sentenced for life and has been ordered to pay a fine of Rs. 2 lakh by the district court in addition to finding him guilty under Section 506 (punishment for criminal intimidation). He was also awarded additional five years in jail and a fine of Rs. 10,000.

All the 11 inhabitant children of this shelter home are now in the care and protection of another shelter home where they are safe and are being given proper medical assistance.

ABANDONED CHILD

INFANT RESCUED BY CHILDLINE

In the month of September, 2012 CHILDLINE Bhagalpur received a phone call informing them that a new born baby had been found inside a roadside dustbin in the town. After receiving the call the CHILDLINE team rushed to the spot and rescued the baby. Left out in the open for hours the child was in a very poor health condition. The team decided to take the baby to a Government hospital in the town and simultaneously lodged a General Diary (G.D.) at the towns' police station. In the mean time they also informed Child Welfare Committee (CWC) about the case so that a decision could be made about the welfare of the infant. After two days of direct medical supervision the child was restored to proper health and the team produced the baby to the CWC. By the order of the CWC the infant has been placed in an orphanage in the district and has also been positioned for adoption by the Specialised Adoption Agency (SAA).

CHILD TRAFFICKING

REPARTRIATION OF THREE BANGLADESHI CHILDREN

CHILDLINE Bhubaneswar repatriated three children to Bangladesh with the help of the Department of Women and Child Development, Odisha and West Bengal police and the local NGOs of West Bengal and Bangaldesh.

Tanni Aktar, Liza Aktar were received on the 17th of January, 2013 and Nayem on the 19th by the General Railway Police while travelling to South India. CHILDLINE Bhubaneswar learnt that the two girls were biological sisters, with the same father but different mothers and belonged to the village of Bagwadi in Bangladesh. According to their statement, while they were heading to their aunt's house, they were kidnapped by two men from Benapal and brought to the Bangladesh border where they crossed the border at Gobardanga, North 24 Parganas. On reaching India, the girls were sold off and taken to Bhubaneswar with the intention of further selling them to a brothel.

After reaching Bhubaneswar, the traffickers tried to get them into a multistoried building. Scared and alone the girls started crying and when the people of the locality rushed to the spot, the traffickers ran away. Looking at their vulnerable condition, people of the locality took them to the railway station and left them there. The girls were then taken to the Mahila Police Station with a female constable and then handed over to CHILDLINE Bhubaneswar.

Nayem, was taken to Chennai by a friend of his father who forcefully employed him in a factory. He fled from this place and got into a Bhubaneswar bound train in the hope of reaching home. However he came into contact with the senior officials of the Bhubaneswar station and was handed over to CHILDLINE Bhubaneswar.

CHILDLINE Bhubaneswar produced the three children to the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Khurdah district. The CWC requested the Secretary of Women and Child Development Department, Govt. of Odisha to take necessary steps for their repatriation to Bangladesh. She immediately wrote to the Resident Commissioner of Odisha Government in New Delhi who in turn wrote to the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi requesting them to verify their addresses and allow travel permits to these children for their repatriation to Bangladesh. After completion of all formalities, the children were taken to Petrapol border on 18th April 2013 and repatriated to Bangladesh with the help of the West Bengal Police. At the Bangladesh border the children were received by the Bangladesh National Women Lawyers' Association for reunification with their respective families.

With the immense help of PRAJJAK, a child rights organization of Kolkata who have an expertise in repatriation cases, and the Bangaldesh National Women Lawyers' Association, Aparejyo-Bangladesh the three children were reunited with their families and the entire process was carried out without any hassles.

CHILD RIGHTS

HUGE CAPITATION FEE DEMANDED BY SCHOOLS IN CUTTACK

During an outreach programme at a slum adjoining the Cuttack railway station, CHILDLINE received complaints from the many children who were studying at Railway Settlement High School. They claimed that the school was collecting capitation fee and other fees from them. The underprivileged parents residing in the slums were unable to send their children to this school because of these fees. CHILDLINE met with the District Project Coordinator (DPC), Sarvo Shiksha Mission to discuss the matter. Based on the complaints the District Project Coordinator deputed an officer in-charge to conduct an inquiry into this. It was revealed that the complaints were true and the same practice was happening in two other schools such as Rajabagicha High School and Ranihat High School. A circular was issued by the DPC mentioning refunding of the capitation fee amount to the children at the earliest, failure of which may result in legal action being taken against the school authorities. Regular follow up with these schools resulted in the refunding of Rs. 14,287 by these schools.

CHILD RAPE

MURDERED MINOR RAPE VICTIM RECEIVES JUSTICE

All of 7, little Urmila Nag was raped and murdered in Sambalpur. On hearing this story, CHILDLINE met with Urmila's family who stressed that the police was not handling the case seriously. Ignoring all the laws and rules, the police even failed to give a copy of the FIR to the family. Further investigations by CHILDLINE brought to light that the officer in charge had botched up the FIR and did not mention crucial sections of the Protection of Children Against Sexual Offences Act 2012 (POCSO) in the same. Even though CHILDLINE advised the inspector in charge to add all the relevant section of the act, the officer was rigid. Looking at the lethargy and insincerity of the police officers, CHILDLINE took up the duty of sensitising the residents of the Sambalpur locality about the POCSO Act. Empowered and strengthened with hope 43 local women accompanied CHILDLINE and approached the town police station. After a lot of coaxing and discussions they were able to convince the police to incorporate the appropriate sections in the FIR, and a copy of this was finally handed over to Urmila's parents. However it was still a long road to justice. The police were yet not demonstrating any seriousness in capturing the culprit.

The media got a hold of Urmila's story and went all out to bring justice for the 7 year old. The locals of Sambalpur were not far behind. They too came forward, protested and blocked the main roads of the city demanding justice. The District Magistrate upon hearing all what was happening, reached the place and ensured that a charge sheet was placed within two days. In no time the culprit was tried for his heinous crime and the court ordered for him to be hanged till death. This decision proved to be a landmark one in the district.

A FEW MORE CASES

- In one of the biggest child trafficking rescue operations in Karnataka's recent history, CHILDLINE and the state police saved 58 children who were being taken as labourers to the flourishing textile mills in Coimbatore district.
- 16 year old Taslima was abducted from her maternal uncle's house in Bangladesh and sold to a red light area in Kolkata, India. She was kidnapped by one of the local goons in her country who had a grudge against her uncle who was a police officer there. Taslima was forced to work as a call girl in various hotels of Purba Midnapore, Paschim Medinipur and other districts of Kolkata. While she was booked at the Airveiw Hotel, one person saw her crying and heard her miserable story. On hearing this, CHILDLINE was called to intervene and efforts are being made to help Taslima return to her home-land.
- An iron industry named Rashmi Metaliks Limited situated at Samraipur employed a huge number of child labourers in their factory for different jobs. Some workers led by Sri Asit Ghosh, Secretary, Rashmi Metaliks Limited Mazdoor Union and CHILDLINE rescued around 21 child labourers and brought them to the Labour Office. Some of them were residents of West Bengal while some had come from outside West Bengal. They were employed mainly in very hazardous jobs. The ages of the child labourers were between 13 -18 years.
- Dnyanada a mentally challenged girl child urgently needed a care taker and a place to stay. CHILDLINE Ahmednagar was
 in regular search of a permanent shelter for her in Maharashtra, MP and Gujarat. The team was constantly following up



through meetings with allied systems but all in vain. Finally the child was provided temporary shelter in homes in MP and later in Gujarat. However after two months both the shelter homes expressed their inability to provide required care to Dnyanada and she was sent back to Ahmednagar. After prolonged discussions, debates and media pressure on the authorities for eight months the child was provided proper shelter and care.

- CHILDLINE Ahmedabad rescued 17 child labourers from zari units in Ramol and 24 more from Naroda factory
- CHILDLINE Tiruvallur received a call from a school teacher that an 8th std student was pregnant. As the girl looked very weak, the teacher had taken her to a private hospital and it was confirmed that she was 4 months pregnant. The CHILDLINE team member met the girl and spoke to her. After a few days of counselling and ensuring confidentiality, the girl came out with the truth that she was being sexually abused by her step father. Though her mother knew the fact, she had threatened her not to tell anyone. The case was referred to the Child Welfare Committee (CWC), an FIR was lodged against the step father and he was arrested. A medical check up was done for the child and she is now undergoing treatment.
- Seven child labourers were rescued from shops and establishments near the Namakkal Bus stand. The child labourers were rescued as part of a raid by the Labour Department, National Child Labour Project (NCLP), CHILDLINE and the State Health department. The children were produced before the Child Welfare Committee. Two of the children have been enrolled in the NCLP special school and the rest of the children are studying in Sarva Shisha Abhyaan (SSA) schools.
- CHILDLINE's working in the 15 districts of Andhra Pradesh were roped into the mission to eradicate child labour and worked closely with the district labour and police departments. The team rescued 1,646 children during the period April 2012 - March 2013.

Cops, Child Line 1098 rescue 21 kids from begging in train

DURG, Nov 8

THE business of begging which gen erally uses kids as lure is thriving across the various trains. On Thursday, with the assistance of Government Railway Police (GRP) of Durg Railway Junction, Child Line 1098-an NGO working for children, rescued 21 kids (14 girls and 7 boys) from the trains, who were engaged in begging

All the rescued kids were in the age group of 18 months to 13 years and they used to beg in trains.

Coordinator of Child Line 1098-Durg District, 'we got information that there was a group of 5 women who used their children for begging in trains. Under Act 24 of Juvenile Justice 2006, it is a criminal act.

Out of 21 rescued kids, maximum 12 were found in local train, followed by 6 kids in Pune Howrah Azad Hind Express and rest 3 in Superfast Express'. He stated that later all rescued kids along with their mothers were taken to office of Child Welfare Committee and after advising them, were released.





YEARLY TREND: ANSWERED CALLS V/S ABANDONED CALLS FOR THE YEAR 2012-2013



CHILDLINE GOES BEYOND THE SERVICE

SPREADING THE WORD

The year 2012-2013 witnessed a growth and advancement in the existing communication tools, issue based projects, new publications, media associations, corporate tie-ups and rigorous awareness programmes at the state and national level.

To raise awareness and garner support, a surge in social networking sites was put into practice. Constant updates and interactions with our online database, local media tie-ups and innovative awareness campaigns/events were accomplished.

ISSUE BASED PROJECTS/ CAMPAIGNS

CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE (CSA) AWARENESS PROJECT

The CSA awareness project which was launched in January 2011 by CHILDLINE is Mumbai's largest communication initiative on CSA awareness. It is the preventive approach of CHILDLINE for children. With 53 percent of Indian children experiencing sexual abuse, the need to spread knowledge and information pertaining to child sexual abuse has increased drastically in more ways than one. CHILDLINES CSA awareness project empowers children to be able to protect themselves from such harm plus educates parents, teachers and concerned citizens about the issue of CSA in detail.

During the year 2012-2013 the CSA awareness project has grown and evolved. CHILDLINE has trained 98 lady volunteers, reached out to 251 schools across Mumbai, Navi Mumbai and Thane and has empowered 1,25,000 children on the topic of Safe Touch, Unsafe touch and Personal Safety Rules. While the awareness project is carried out extensively in schools through story telling sessions, the process does not end here. This program has also been propagated through outreach in malls and colleges by means of kiosks and workshops.

The CSA team organized successful training workshops for interested lady employees of TCS and Wipro within the office premises to increase the volunteer support.

• Workshops on The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act - 2012 (POCSO)

The year 2012 saw the emergence of a new law on Child Sexual Abuse - The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act - 2012. It was noticed however that stakeholders themselves did not know various aspects of this new law and a large number of victims failed to get any support due to lack of certain crucial knowledge of the law.

A workshop on the newly implemented POCSO Act was a much needed requirement for those who received the 1098 calls on a daily basis at the CHILDLINE Contact Centre (CCC). 38 CHILDLINE Call Operators (CCO) from the CCC were trained about the law and its implications through detailed workshops and extensive sessions.

CHILDLINE FEATURES ON SATYAMEV JAYATE

The much talked about show of 2012 – 'Satyamev Jayate' hosted by Aamir Khan brought to light the taboo topic and the perils of child sexual abuse. The episode had an immense impact on people all over the country. The physical, psychological and behavioural impact of sexual crimes on children was discussed in detail which in turn gave way to break the silence around the issue of CSA.

The work done by CHILDLINE for CSA was also discussed on the show along with how there were no rigid laws in India against such heinous crimes towards children. Till the day the episode was aired the law against child sexual abuse was still pending. Two weeks after touching this grave issue in great depth, the POCSO Act was finally passed by the law makers of the country. Victims who had nowhere to go were now encouraged to come out and narrate their story. 1098 began getting more and more calls for help from all over the country. The show helped in bringing awareness on the topic of CSA and the work done by CHILDLINE.

Satyamev Jayte pledged donations to CHILDLINE India Foundation with Reliance Foundation's commitment to match the funds raised by Satyamev Jayte.



CSA Awareness Workshop In Mumbai

22 enthusiastic volunteers from all corners of Mumbai joined hands to create awareness about Safe and Unsafe Touch amongst Mumbai's children. The training workshop on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) Awareness for lady volunteers was held over 2 days at the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) International House, Mumbai Central.

All volunteers who became a part of the CSA Awareness family of volunteers were required to undergo the 2 day training in order to ensure that sensitivity is a key part of their communication with children. The training aimed to equip volunteers not only to become good communicators but also to seek to expand their knowledge base about the issue of CSA. Hence, the training was divided into two components: knowledge and skills. The session on '1098 service & how it works' was conducted by Mr. Kiran More from the Committed Communities Development Trust (CCDT), a CHILDLINE partner. Mr. Kiran took the participants through the processes that were put in place once a call was received on 1098 and also elaborated on how the CHILDLINE service ran through its vast partner network.

Mr. Nishit Kumar, Head, Communication and Strategic Initiatives, CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF) talked about 'Child Protection and Child Rights' (CPCR).

A session on 'Understanding Child Sexual Abuse (CSA)' was conducted by Trupti Panchal, Assistant Professor-Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), who held the interest of volunteers as she took them through all aspects of CSA. Ms. Sneha Shah and Mr. Shashank Gupta from ISRA - Centre for Training & Development helped the volunteers loosen up and gave them tips on handling some unexpected situations that might arise.



WORLD DAY AGAINST CHILD LABOUR

Each year June 12th is dedicated to the empowerment of children against all forms of child labour. The objective remains to create awareness amongst the public on the evils of Child Labour and compel people to stand up against the harm caused to children.


In the North, a seminar on 'Abolition of Child Labour' was conducted by CHILDLINE Varanasi in association with the Labour department and District Legal Service Authority, Varanasi to observe the day. SK Sinha, Labour Enforcement Officer and Anurag Mishra, Assistant Labour Commissioner spoke on the occasion. As part of the week - long celebration of World Day Against Child Labour, CHILDLINE Parbhani of the West region conducted an awareness rally against child labour. The rally was a great success as it helped to sensitise the local residents, market vendors, pedestrians and the general public on the evils of Child Labour. The rally saw a participation of over 50 enthusiastic children.

To commemorate this day Tarun Gogoi, Chief Minister, Assam flagged off a rally in Guwahti. Speaking on the occasion, Gogoi said that 'Every child is entitled to the right to education and the right to life. But it is sad to see that mostly educated people employ children in their houses. Child labour is a crime and we need to join hands against this social evil.' The day also witnessed over 100 social activists taking an oath to never eat in restaurants and hotels that employ Child Labour during a special programme organised by CHIDLINE Berhampur with support from Campaign against Child Labour (CACL) and the District Legal Service Authority. Packed with performances by young actors, the 'Koottukarkkoru Kalimuttam' (a space to play with friends) staged by children from I.E.C School, Kodinji, Malappuram sent out a strong message to the large crowds gathered to watch. The play on the plight of children working in circuses had interesting folk songs and dances too. The event was organised by CHILDLINE Malappuram along with District Information Office.









CHILDLINE SE DOSTI

CHILDLINE Se Dosti is a week-long national campaign from the 14th - 20th November, to make ordinary citizens stakeholders in CHILDLINE 1098. The primary objective of this campaign is to spread awareness amongst those who remain unaware about the work done by CHILDLINE and generate CHILDLINE 'Dosts' everywhere! This period is inclusive of a range of events and activities across the country. Keeping with the spirit of CHILDLINE, this week aims at reaching out to people from all sections of the society and sensitize them to the cause of children and initiate an action towards change. The campaigns created aim to generate a Million 'Dosts' for CHILDLINE and acquaint people with Child Rights and Protection.

From rickshaw and bus outreach programmes, signature campaigns, walkathons, rallies, tying of the surakshabandan to police personnel to nukkad nataks, each city/district in India was bustling with events and activities during the week long dosti celebrations.

While a rally was taken out by CHILDLINE Madurai and Madurai Institute of Social Sciences to create awareness about 1098, school students tied wristbands to Railway Protection Force (RPF) personnel in Trichy since the first contact runaway children may make at railway stations is with the Railway Protection Force. Spreading awareness about the lives of vulnerable children and to get people involved in their rehabilitation, an innovative campaign was held in Kolkata by a group of deprived kids inside a tram. Inmates of various homes, in Vijayawada, organised a 'street play' against child labour, child marriages and on protection of the girl child. 'Surakshapen akan a Repargraph meaon account of Child Line Se Dosti Week-



2012, was inaugurated in the office of the District Police Commissioner, Dakshina Kannada. Around 80 HIV-AIDS affected children, mostly from economically backward families in the Trichy district had a double bonanza celebrating Children's Day and Deepavali. Crackers, sweets, sports and games set the tone for the revelry organised by CHILDLINE and Rainbow, an organisation run by Marist Brothers. Akki's Pathshala, a project started by CHILDLINE Nashik to prevent school drop-outs, bring the under privileged in the mainstream of the society and to prevent crime, celebrated this week with a lot of vigour. Hundreds of people promised to protect child rights at a signature campaign organised by CHILDLINE Mysore along with Department of Women and Child Welfare to garner people's support.







INTERNATIONAL CHILD HELPLINE DAY

17th May is declared as the International Child Helpline Day by Child Helpline International. To celebrate the continuous efforts of child help lines all over the world, CHILDLINE India Foundation observed the day by raising awareness about 1098 and drawing attention to the vital role of a helpline for every child.

A Signature campaign emphasizing the evils of Child Marriage was organized by CHILDLINE Bidar in Gadgi. The Director, CHILDLINE Bidar requested the gathering to participate in upholding the rights of the child. 



CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY



Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Limited (HPCL)

CHILDLINE operates three vans with support from HPCL - one each in Mumbai, Delhi and Kolkata. The 3 vans are geared to provide a quick and reliable mode of transport: to rescue and transport children from a risk ridden situation to a safer space, to create access for children in those places which are difficult to reach without a vehicle, to act as a tool for outreach programs at locations such as colleges, schools, markets, theatres, fairs etc and to help create a greater awareness which cannot be achieved only by stationary kiosks or stalls.

During the year 2012-2013 the vans helped reach out to 6677 children in Mumbai, 3615 in Delhi and 6037 children in Kolkata. The operations ranged between generating door to door awareness, rescuing children from domestic labour, child marriage, beggary rackets etc to creating mass outreach programs at public spaces and conducting orientation programs and training workshops for the police force, boosting health camps as well as interactions with street vendors.





HSBC

Life skill training programme for children involved in substance abuse including those at risk.

The training for the key team members was organized at Delhi from 9th July to 13th July 2012. The project aims to study and assess the nature and magnitude of substance abuse in children and the need for intervention at 3 key locations each in 10 cities - Mumbai, Nashik, Bhopal, Guwahati, Noida, Shimla, Gorakpur, Hyderabad, Vizag and Bangalore. This was planned as a psychosocial intervention by using life skills training for inhalant using street children. The project targets at facilitating awareness and linkages with stakeholders for a coordinated response towards children subject to substance abuse. It also ensures mechanisms for sustained support, counselling and treatment as well as long term rehabilitation for these children.

The project is expected to assist in increasing awareness on the ill effects of substance abuse amongst children through counselling, workshops and constant meetings. A stronger protection mechanism for children at risk is intended through increased intervention and training for children subject to substance abuse; and increased awareness about tackling the issue amongst stakeholders, individuals and groups who are directly or indirectly associated to the issue of substance abuse amongst children.




TATA AIA LIFE


The awareness program reached about 35 cities covering about 750 schools. Special interactive programs were also organized for about 65,000 children.




GRAPHICAL OVERVIEW

CHILDLINE PARTNERS AND CIF GOVERNMENT OF INDIA GRANT RECEIPTS





- a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India and the applicable Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India
 - All Income and Expenditure items in the financial statement are recognised on accrual basis.
- b) Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes all expenses relating to acquisition and installation of these assets. Fixed assets acquired out of the amounts received from donors towards specific projects are charged to the relevant project and accounted in the Fixed Assets schedule at a nominal value of Re.1 with a corresponding entry in sundry receipts of the same amount. Assets received free (as donations) are carried at nominal value.
- c) Depreciation is charged as per the method and rate as per the Income Tax Act, 1961. Depreciation on fixed assets has been charged to the Income and Expenditure Account
- d) Donations received for restricted revenue funds are taken to the 'Funds and Liabilities' in the Balance Sheet. Expenses incurred are disclosed under the head "Expenses on the Objects of the Trust" with an equivalent amount disclosed under the head "Transfer from Earmarked Funds" in the Income and Expenditure Account. Amount received towards purchase of Fixed Assets, are shown under 'Earmarked Funds' and expenditure incurred, if any, will be debited to such earmarked fund.

SCHEDULE 'K' NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

- a) Block Grant received from the Government of India and recorded as liability at the time of receipt, is disbursed to Partner Organisations on the basis of signed agreements between Childline India Foundation and Partner Organisations.
 - The liability is reduced by disbursements made/payable to Partner Organisations. The expenditures of Partner Organisations are certified by professional accountants. The Management of Childline India Foundation relies on these utilization certificates which form the basis of accounting.
- b) Fees payable to Charity Commissioner amounting to Rs.35,41,895/- for the years ended 31st March 2009 to 2013 has not been paid, as the authorities under instructions of the Bombay High Court are not collecting the fees.
- c) During the year, with effect from 1st August 2012, the Governing Board of the foundation has established a Staff Welfare Fund for the benefit of employees with an initial contribution of Rs.25 Lacs by transferring the said amount from the Income & Expenditure Account.
 - Going forward, as per the decision of the governing board, 10% of the annual surplus would be transferred to the Staff Welfare Fund, subject to a maximum annual contribution of Rs.10 Lacs.
- d) Previous year figures are regrouped wherever necessary to conform to this year's classification.



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CHILDLINE INDIA FOUNDATION

The CHILDLINE service, which has been developed and managed by CHILDLINE India Foundation (CIF), is a 24x7, emergency, free phone outreach service linking children in need of help and protection to organisations run by government departments as well as those run by civil society agencies. Children or concerned adults dial the number 1098 and are connected to the CHILDLINE service in their city.

Street children and youth living alone on urban streets, child labourers especially in the unorganized sector, children who have been abused, child victims of the flesh trade, differently-abled children, child addicts, children in conflict with the law, children in institutions, mentally ill children, children affected by HIV/AIDS or other long term diseases, children affected by conflicts and disasters, child political refugees, children whose families are in crisis, gender linked abortion of female foetuses, undernourished children, illiterate children are among the host of issues plaguing children in India.

At present, CHILDLINE operates in 277 cities and/towns across the country and services over four million calls a year.

CHILDLINE is India's first national level response to the ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC). Additionally, the CHILDLINE 1098 service receives special mention in the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection) Act 2000- the Government has requested CHILDLINE to act as a catalyst in bringing together State agencies and voluntary agencies at the local level to ensure implementation of the Act.

The Government of India cites the CHILDLINE service as part of services to UN for the United Nations Convention of Child Rights commitments. When the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD) came into being in 2006, it recognized CHILDLINE India Foundation as the Nodal Mother NGO for implementing the CHILDLINE model across all districts in India. Furthermore in order to put in place a process framework for the implementation of Child Protection, CHILDLINE joined hands with The National Institute of Social Defence and developed a program: 'National Initiative for Child Protection (NICP)'. This has subsequently become the framework for the MWCD initiated Integrated Child Protection Scheme program (ICPS). The Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS) of the ministry, funds the expansion of CHILDLINE services and has targeted the end of 12th Plan to cover all 600+ districts of India.

OBJECTIVES OF CHILDLINE INDIA

- To reach out to every child in need of care and protection by responding to emergencies on 1098 and by physically reaching out to children.
- To adapt and integrate telecommunication technology, linking all districts to the service of 1098, and making it available to all children in need of care and protection.
- To provide a platform of networking amongst organisations and to provide linkages to support systems that facilitates the rehabilitation of children in need of care and protection.
- To work together with the Allied Systems (Police, Health Care, Juvenile Justice, Transport, Legal, Education, Communication, Media, Political and the Community) to create child friendly systems.
- To advocate for services for children that are inaccessible, non-existent or inadequate.
- To create a body of NGOs and Government organisations working within the national framework and policy for children.
- To be a nodal child protection agency in the country, providing child protection services to children in need of care and protection.
- To contribute and work towards strengthening and participating in a global movement that addresses issues related to child protection and ensures that children's voices are heard.

PROGRAMMES AND ACTIVITIES

Responding to calls on the national toll free number 1098 and provision to rescue and offer emergency outreach services for children in need of care and protection;

- Coordinating rescue and other outreach services with the help of relevant local departments like police, administration, labour, health, railways and others.
- Ensuring proper documentation of all children rescued to facilitate their rehabilitation and restoration, where necessary
- Producing children before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) to ensure care and protection.



- Supporting the CWC in the long-term rehabilitation of children, where required.
- Supporting a national network for the tracking of missing children.
- Providing data related to children rescued and rehabilitated for the compilation of a national comprehensive database of child protection.
- Creating awareness and ensuring access to the 1098 Child helpline (CHILDLINE) number.
- · Creating research, documentation, awareness and advocacy on issues related to the Child helpline.
- Establishing linkages with other child protection services, community and local bodies to meet the immediate needs of children rescued.

THE CHILDLINE MODEL

CHILDLINE is a unique partnership between the Government of India, Department of Telecommunications, Voluntary agencies, Academic institutes, the corporate sector, children and the community

THE PARTNERSHIP MODEL OF CHILDLINE INDIA

CHILDLINE is the crucial link between children in need of care and protection and the available services. For children with different needs, who call in anytime, anywhere, and for anything, we act as a one-point contact, which facilitates instant access to support, advice, active intervention or just a listening ear. We connect children in emergency on one end of the phone line to a well-connected network of services - services that already exist. No new shelter, no new hospital, no new infrastructure is built.

We at CHILDLINE believe that for a helpline to be successful and effective in reaching out to the millions of children deprived of their childhood, we need to work in a partnership framework. A framework that recognizes that:

- A helpline cannot operate in isolation
- All partners involved in the helpline share a reciprocal relationship
- Each partner has clear and definite roles in the partnership model. This leads to a feeling of joint ownership towards the model.
- All partners share the vision, mission and the success of the model.

CHILDLINE OPERATIONAL STRUCTURES AND PROCESSES

CHILDLINE CONTACT CENTRE (CCC)

CCC is a 24 hour, centralized voice response facility of CHILDLINE using contemporary BPO (Business Processes Outsourcing) technology at Vikhroli in Mumbai. The CCC is a continuous operation and tracks all calls coming in including those that land at the switch but are either terminated or 'abandoned' before a CCC member can answer it. CCC uses contemporary CRM software for real time data analysis and currently services all cities in the North and West regions of India.

NODAL ORGANISATION

The nodal organisation is usually an academic institute or Non Government Organisation with networking, training, coordination and research skills. A city coordinator is supervised by the Nodal Director who ensures creation of a protective environment for children at the city level.

EMERGENCY INTERVENTION CENTRES

The Emergency Intervention Centres are voluntary agencies, which shall function as the call centres for CHILDLINE. They work 24 hours and respond to calls that are received on the 1098 CHILDLINE service. The centre coordinator manages a team that intervenes in emergency cases and conducts outreach and networking activities.



CHILDLINE SUPPORT AGENCIES/ SUB - CENTRES

CHILDLINE Collaborative Partner is also called the Collaborative Centre, there will be, approximately, 5 to 7 Sub-Centres in districts (and 1-3 support agencies in cities) as per the specific need in the district/city, according to the nature of the population and geographical spread in the district. A team of three CHILDLINE staff members assisted by two volunteers from the Mahila Samakhya members, anganwadi workers, teachers, and woman members of the panchayat assist the Sub-Centre staff at the taluka and village levels. They will follow up on children who have returned to the village and provide information when children are being recruited and help the local community to prevent child labour.

CHILDLINE ADVISORY BOARD (CAD) OR DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE (DAC)

CHILDLINE Advisory Board or District Advisory Committee (DAC) is headed by the Collector and other members includes the District Officers for Health and Education, major NGO like Mahila Samakhya and others stimulate the development of the programme in the district.

RESOURCE ORGANISATIONS

Resource organisations act as centres for referral by CHILDLINE. They include the various organisations and institutions providing services for children or work on children's issues. They also participate in outreach and awareness programmes for CHILDLINE.
